

Dr. Balram Singh (Former Head) Department of Physics H D Jain College, Ara

Established on 21st January, 1942, H D Jain College, Ara was the first institution of higher learning ever set up in the economically and academically backward region of Sahabad, in fact the first college between Patna and Varanasi. 'It owes its foundation to the Late Babu Harprasad Das Jain, a rich landlord and philanthropist of the town. He himself had little formal education but was a great lover of learning and firmly believed that progress and learning walked arm in arm. He executed a trust deed and donated all his property to charities in 1918. He founded Sri Adinath Trust and set apart sixty thousand rupees for setting up a College at Ara in 1919. Needless to say he was inspired to do so owing to his indomitable love of learning and innate philanthropy. He had the support and co-operation of his close friends Sri Suparshwa Das Gutpa, an educationist and retired magistrate, Sri Chakreshwar Kumar Jain, Sri Nirmal Kumar Jain and Babu Awadh Bihari Sharan, a legal luminary of the town.

Unfortunately Babu Harprasad Das Jain passed away untimely in 1920 and the college somehow or the other didn't see the light of day till 1941. However, it

was founded on the auspicious day of Vasant Panchami (21st January) in 1942. Sri Adinath Trust generously donated Rs. 1,55,000 for its functioning and management. The college was named after Babu Harprasad Das Jain as a grateful tribute to the blessed soul. Within a few years of its inception the college made great strides; its fame spread far and wide and students from almost all parts of Bihar and the neighbouring state of UP started pouring on. On account of its high standard of quality teaching and academic pursuits it made mark as one of the leading institutions of Bihar and won recognition even on the national level. In deference to the request of the college Governing Body the erstwhile ruler of Dumraon, Maharaja Bahadur Ram Ran Vijay Prasad Singh, donated 13.35 acres of land to this college in the heart of the town. A small hostel was initially built on the piece of land, and later on a large hostel was constructed there with the aid of the UGC.

The college was affiliated to Patna University, then the only university in Bihar. Initially it was granted permission to impart teaching in Arts and Commerce faculties upto graduation level. Teaching in Science faculty was started in 1951. Recognizing the standard of its quality teaching Patna University granted permission for teaching Honours Courses in Hindi and Economics in 1945, and thereafter in Political Science in 1953.

ABOUT LOCATION : 'ARA' (BHOJPUR) BIHAR

Ara is the administrative headquarters for Bhojpur District which itself come into being in 1972 by Separating Shahabad districts in two divisions namely Bhojpur and Rohtas. The current Bhojpur area came to reality in 1972. When Buxar segment of the region was separated as a new district. Ara also known as Arrah is presently headquarters of Bhojpur district in Bihar. Though the city has gone significant changes in recent decades but imprints of its past is still present and reminds the glory of age old eras.

The name 'Ara' originated from the Sanskrit word "Aranya' which depicts forest. It demonstrates that this place was bordered by thick forests in the prehistoric era. According to a saga during exile when pandavas were existing in this province, they used to adore the goddess 'Aranya' Bhimsen destroyed monster 'Bakasur' at Chakra Ara and this was, soon after called 'Ara'. An antique shrine of Devi Aranya is worshipped even today in this town. It is believed that the jungles were shattered by Mughal intruders between 1759 and 1765.

Arrah founds mention in various mythological and historical texts. One can

find many age old temples and Jain site in this part of Bihar. The city witnessed a famous battle of Buxar which was fought in the year1764. During pre independence era Bhojpur and Buxar were interlinked as a single unit. The battle led to the defeat of grand alliances between Mir Kasim, Nawab of Begal, Mughal Emperor Shah Alam II and Shuja-ud-daulla, Nawab of Avadh. Major Hector Monro under the banner of East India Company wiped out the opponents. The battle is recorded in annals of history as it led to establishment of British rule and supremacy on firm footing in India.

The region played imperative function in the rebellion of 1857 which is also known as First war of Independence. During outbreak of 'sepoy mutine' of 1857, Babu Kunwar Singh of Jagdihspur battled against the British rule and was successful on many occasions. He brought down the union Jack from Jagdishpur fort and hoisted his flag. The interesting part is that he was eighty years old during the outbreak of rebellion but then also successfully countered British on many occasions.

The freedom movement of 1942 took a livid twist in the region and on 28th. September 1942 a courageous freedom fighter 'Kavi Kailash' of town achieved in hoisting the tri-colour flag on the collectorate but eventually he was tormented brutally by the British constable and he was clinched to death. Arrah is home to many eminent personalities from various fields. National leaders like Babu Jagjiwan Ram, Dr. Ram Subhag Singh and others who fought tremendously for the freedom struggle and become significant Politicians of independent India, were born in this town. The renowned mathematician Dr. Bashishtha Narain Singh was also born in this district.

This region has for all time presented as the model of collective harmony. People of each and every religious conviction energetically take part in the celebrations of each other. In addition to numerous temples of Hindus Churches, Mosques, Gurudwaras and Jain temples are also in considerable numbers in the town. The renowned Aranya Devi temple and Shahi Masjid of Muslims are positioned in the heart of the city. The town has two Churches and King George -V performed prayers in the cathedral located in the west of the town. The antique shrine of Lord Shiva named as 'Sidhnath Mahadeo' in the Muhalla Bindtoli is supposed to be illustrated in the Ramayana. The city is as will been set in elevated regard by Jain disciples due to existence of range of Jain shrines and holy place.

The economy of Arrah relies chiefly on farming and cultivation which is due to Sone Canal in its southern side and rich Gangatic plains in the north. Rice, Pulse, Maize and wheat are the chief crops of Arrah, although other crops like gram, arhar, mansoor & sugarcane. As well as fruity trees like Guava and mango form a considerable portion of the agricultural cultivation of this region. The region is extremely fertile for vegetable cultivation, particularly potatoes and tomatoes.

The city has a well equipped rail network, it is on main railway route Howrah /

Kolkatta --- New Delhi. It has good connectivity to major destinations. All the major trains in this route halts in the city. Although Arrah does not have an airport, the city is well connected by road to the nearest airport located in the State Capital Patna. The airport is located 45 Kms away from the city with ample number of buses and taxis plying. All the major air carriers connect Patna to other major cities of India.

A. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

Criterion I gives an account of H D Jain College's academic programmes, and innovations and achievements in enriching the University prescribed curriculum. This account is anchored in the unique vision and mission of the College, which shapes its teaching objectives. The College is committed to the core principle of enabling self-actualization in students and teachers through participatory structures which feed into, and are in return augmented by, multi- point linkages with external fields. The vision, mission and guiding principles of the College are disseminated through the website, regular events of interaction between the present community and the alumni, the Annual Founder's Day Celebrations and the College magazine 'Abhiyan'. The prescribed University curriculum, to which the College strictly adheres, is implemented through Staff Council-mandated committees such as the IQAC and Research Committee'. This system of Committees ensures that the stated objectives of the curriculum are well achieved in the course of implementation. Additionally, departments have internal systems for workload allocation, preparing Lesson plan, taking stock of teaching progress, mid-Session internal tests, moderation of internal assessment, and reviewing student performance. While the College benefits from implementation support from the University, it also internally supports its teaching staff through open channels of communication, provision of leave for capacity-building initiatives, and financial assistance to attend academic events. We also provides infrastructural and technological support in the form of ICT-enabled classrooms, laboratories, library and research database access, Wi-Fi internet access, laptops, etc. Enabling and encouraging

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research and publication by students is an important means to operationalize curriculum more effectively, especially through the internal assessment component. Extra-classroom enrichment events, from offsite trips to seminars are also organized in significant numbers every year. Relationships with research bodies and the University are maintained, firstly, through the College. Teachers of the College have secured prestigious research projects, publish regionally & nationally, as well as through university centres. Teach at the postgraduate level; and several serve in University posts (including as Mentor at the Cluster Innovation Centre). Thirdly, through the students: a large number participate in the National Service Scheme (NSS) and the National Cadet Corps (NCC), which have a tiered structure from the College to the university level. Finally, faculty, students and the College as a whole participate enthusiastically in Tarang (the University's annual cultural event), and events such as -Swachh Bharat Abhiyan and World Yoga Day. A significant number of the College faculty is actively engaged in curriculum design and syllabus development at the University. Teachers also serve on various high level committees of the university from time to time such as the Academic Council, Executive Council, Deanships of student welfare, Committees of Courses and Studies, and contribute to distance education initiatives. In addition to University-prescribed courses, the College has at various times offered auxiliary value-addition programs, such as remedial classes, coaching for entry in Govt. services, soft skill development, some of which are designed in-house by the faculty and are self-funding.

The culmination of all the above factors from the University level, through the College, and down to the College departments and student societies, is a holistic and flexible approach to the curriculum, as the core of developing the student into a well-rounded citizen. This Criterion specifically sets out how the College enables its students to develop competence in and awareness of cross-cutting issues such as, gender, climate change and environmental education, and human rights.

A system of feedback on the College's curriculum-related activities has also been devised. Additionally, student feedback opportunities are ensured by the College Departments' practice of maintaining open communication.

CRITERION II : TEACHING-LEARNING AND VALUATION

The college has an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) that meets periodically to discuss the various issues regarding teaching-learning and evaluation. The process of admitting students to various programmes is transparent. Students are admitted on the basis of their performance in qualifying exams followed by an Counselling. However, the college follows the guidelines laid down by the Government of Bihar in matter of reservation. It is a co-educational institution, and in some disciplines the number of girls exceeds that of boys. For differently-abled students also, there is a reservation policy. Freeship is given to economically marginalized students. For all-round development of students, the college offers a proper blend of academics and sports. Before the commencement of various programs, there is an orientation program in which the students are made aware of the traditions and objectives of the college. The college is sensitive to the needs of disadvantaged students for whom gap, remedial classes, counselling and special classes are organized. The academic progress of students are carefully and continuously monitored. Great emphasis is laid on assignments and continuous internal evaluation. The college lays great stress on attendance. The college follows the academic calendar of the university. The teaching-learning method is increasingly becoming student-centered. In some departments like BBA, B.Sc (IT) Hons., free internet access is provided to students so that they can use it for selfstudy. College has a well-stocked central library from which students borrow books regularly.

CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

The college encourages and extends all help possible to promote research activities in the college. Adequate infrastructure and human resources are provided by the institution for smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects and other research initiatives. Network centre, journals and e-journals are made available to all faculties to facilitate research activities in the college. College in member of INFLIBNET and faculty members have got their own N-list A/C and password, with this facility one can access thousand of e-journals and research databases. Teachers are motivated in the department to pursue at least one minor/major research project in their area of specialization or one that is inter-disciplinary in nature. Several faculty members have published and presented a large number of research papers in various National / International seminars in their individual capacity and in collaboration with associates. The study circle of the teacher's council holds interdisciplinary sessions for paper presentations by annual college magazine.

The college boasts of excellent record of accomplishment with respect to extension activities in the different categories like Community development, Social work, Health and hygiene awareness, Health camp, Adult education and literacy, Blood donation camp, Environment awareness, Gender sensitization etc. college has two units of NCC and two units of NSS. A neighboring Dalit Tola has been adopted by the NSS Units of the college for creating health-care/hygiene/education awareness. NSS and NCC Cadets visit the local orphanage on important festivals for distribution of gifts among the inmates, to share the joys of living with them. Community orientation activities are reflected through blood donation camps/AIDS /nutrition awareness programmes. The NSS Units organize extension programmes like cleaning/plantation/literacy mission/community health/ blood donation camps/National Youth Day/relief work. The Women's Cell addresses issues regarding women staff/students, primarily fostering their social responsibilities and imparting information about sexual harassment. It takes initiatives for guidance/counseling of women students. Extension activities ensure the growth of students' awareness as responsible and humane citizens.

CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

As for infrastructural and learning resource facilities we possess a huge and magnificent building structure spread over in 22.18 acres of land in an area which has become the epicenter of education. Total built up area is 26304.00 sq.mtr. We have 25 classrooms in the Science, Arts and Commerce blocks in the main building, 01 Seminar hall, 19 laboratories, 02 botanical garden, 01 rich library, 01 language labs, 01 computer lab, 01 field for outdoor games and a unique gymnasium and an environmental friendly green campus. We have a boy's hostel for 80 inmates, 02 separate common rooms for boys & girls. We have recreational and health care facilities, internet and Wi-Fi facilities in campus. The college ensures optimal allocation and utilization for available financial resources for maintenance and upkeep of available facilities and is always seeking to add new ones.

The sprawling lawns and vast playgrounds lend magnificence to the physical infrastructure. The Environment Society ensures that the campus remains pollution free and green. To keep it healthy and eco-friendly, burning of dry leaves and polythene bags are prohibited on the campus. A visiting doctor attends to the minor medical needs of the staff/students. In coordination with other academic support units on campus, the Library provides services that support the College's diverse curriculum in Arts, Commerce, Science and Information Technology. The impressive collection of books, journals and other library material provides resources to explore all areas of human knowledge within the framework of learning. Internet facility is available for all library users. The use of ICT as a learning resource, which enables individualized instruction and collaborative learning, is being used by a couple of departments. ICT rich environment is being further developed to encourage students to become more focused in their learning.

Augmentation of infrastructural facilities has been a regular practice for promoting and sustaining the academic excellence. In order to make a continuous improvement in the infrastructure of the college, the college sends its concrete proposals to UGC in successive Five-Year plans. With the help of the grants received from UGC in five year plans, the institution has continuously expanded its infrastructure in order to keep pace with academic challenges.

The college Budget Committee allocates money for a maintenance fund in its Annual Budget for maintaining the physical infrastructure of the college. The Institution makes best possible efforts to keep the whole college campus beautiful & sanitized with the help of its own team of gardeners and other facilities like grass cutter, water pumps etc. The whole college campus is full of beautiful plants and lush green lawns.

The college has 02 Gensets for uninterrupted supply of electricity and 01 bore wells for maintaining the drinking water supply. Central computer centre, Language lab, Central Instrumentation lab enrich the teaching learning experience in the college.

Wi-Fi networking has been setup in campus by Bihar State Govt. Smart boards have been installed in most of PG science departments. The college has a separate Department of B.Sc.(IT) in the Self-Financing Scheme. It has 50 functional computers. Moreover, computer facility with internet connection is also available in Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Psychology, BBA and B.Sc. (IT) department.

Library is also being computerized with a standard software. The central library has about 60,000 books and it subscribes to a number of research journals, periodicals, magazines and newspapers. To maintain discipline in the library and supervise its smooth functioning a Library Advisory Committee is constituted every year. The campus is equipped with CCTV camera at prominent places to make the environment free from ragging or any type of harassment.

The college has a well equipped sports and physical education center, having facilities of outdoor and indoor games. Students are always encouraged to make maximum possible use of these facilities. The institution has achieved a distinction of establishing a gymnasium and wrestling facility in the college campus. It is worth mentioning that students of the college have always represented university, state and national tournaments.

In order to attend the medical emergencies in the college, the institution has got the facility of health care centre having the services of a part time doctor.

CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

Students are the real wealth of a nation. They are the potential human resources for national development. Only well groomed and nicely nurtured students with the dexterity of hand, head and heart can be fine human beings. The college has fine fusion of the excellence of academics and extra curricular activities. Various student support and progression activities bloom the hidden creative talent. There is foolproof safety and security for the girls. NCC, NSS and different societies contribute profusely for the complete personality of the students. The distinguished Alumni of the college always provides for further support and progression of the students. The college has a rich roll of highly skilled academicians. Both formative and summative evaluation approaches to test the achievements are practiced. Remedial classes and special coaching classes are held for the weak students so that they can perform well. Students' Career & Counselling Cell keeps a vigilant eye on the progress of the students. NCC, NSS, Sports and different students societies bring out the multi-dimensional development of the students.

CRITERION VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT.

Since this college is a constituent unit of V.K.S.U, Ara the major affairs regarding of policy, examination, course curriculum and personnels are managed by university. The College administration is assigned by the different committees, councils and board constituted by the head of the institution Principal/Prof.-In-Charge as per the guide – line framed by university, govt., and UGC to maintain transparency in management. There is a Bursar (Income) and a Bursar (Expenditure) appointed by the university who looks after the incoming and outgoing funds of the college.

Teamwork leads to the best practices of the institution. The participative/democratic principle of the management propels all plans and policies and their implementation and effect, towards consultation with the committees and boards. IQAC looks after the quality in imparting education. Thus, empowerment through total decentralization of the administrative system promotes co-operation, sharing of knowledge and innovations. The development, supervised by the management, comprises extension of building, providing additional facilities, introduction of new courses, inclusion of new faculty, employing visiting teachers, etc. The democratic set-up is extensive with each unit having fullest freedom to innovate and plan its perspectives of development, maintaining the line of hierarchy to ensure harmony. Funds are

allocated/grants are applied for as per UGC schemes for the building/development projects of the college. Income/expenditures are closely monitored by the Bursar and Accountant and overseen by the Principal. Judicious expenditure of funds involving proper procedure for purchases by the Purchase Committee with regular audit (Internal and external) of the budget indicates transparency in financial affairs.

The governance of the college is democratic and participative. Various cells and committees have been delegated with adequate power and responsibility. Admission committees looks after the fair admission process, Proctorial Board looks after the discipline in the campus, college development committee makes planning and its implementations for the all round development of the college. The teachers and the non-teaching staff works as a group. Meetings of the teachers and non-teaching staffs are held regularly. Grooming of leadership is done at four levels – academic and research (among the teachers), curricular, extra-curricular (among students) and environmental (both students and others). The traditional tubes and bulbs have been replaced with CFL, LED and Solar lights. The college has power saving features on all the computers in the labs. Besides, there is a rule that each electronic item should be unplugged when it is not in use. Solar lamps have been installed. Realizing the scarcity of water, Rain Water Harvesting system has been introduced. 'Go Green and Keep Clean' is the paradigm principle of the institution. Ramps for differently-abled students have been made. For the optimum and effective functioning of the college, administrative mechanism has been decentralized through different layers like Academic Council, the Heads of the departments and various committees. The whole campus has Wi-fi connectivity INFLIBNET N-List facilities for eearning and easy browsing of the books and journals have been provided to the students. Many concessions in Admission fee are given to the poor, outstanding and needy students. The college also helps them to get many stipends, scholarships and financial Aids from many NGOs and other organizations. Remedial classes are held to boost the academic acumen of weak students. Many incentives are given to the meritorious students.

The prime objective of the institution is the growth of the complete personalities of the students so that they can be first rate citizens who can contribute for National Development. SWOC Analysis of the College

Strengths:

- Established in 1942, H D Jain College, Ara is the premier and one of the oldest higher educational institutions of Bihar with distinct reputation for excellent teaching performance.
- The College is proud of its library collection. It is one of the earliest libraries in the University to have automated with OPAC and bar code tracking to all its books. The College follows the practice of annual weeding out of books, done by the faculty of different departments.
- The annual college magazine 'ABHIYAN' has been published since 1942 regularly providing platform to portray creativity of students and teachers, it is popular among academics since long.
- The College has moved to the forefront of the knowledge-based economy by incorporating technology in its pedagogical methodology. The entire college campus is Wi-Fi enabled and ICT facility is provided to the library and to the classrooms.
- The huge 22.18 acres college campus has minimal spaces covered with concrete. Its sprawling green lawns are consistent with the best environmental practices and water harvesting mechanisms. They also serve as cultural hot-spots for student activities.
- The college has a dedicated teaching & non-teaching staff who is managing the Institution against all odds.
- Institutional Social Commitments are fulfilled through active participation in outreach activities under piloting of NSS and NCC.
- Teachers regularly participates in seminars, workshops and conferences to get updated on the changing trends in education and related areas.

- The principal personally interacts with the students of each department in regular manner to get their problems, if any, and solve.
- The principal seek advice from guardians, students, local socialites, employers regarding betterment of teaching and learning quality during interaction with them, which is organized on regular basis.

Weaknesses :

- Acute shortage of permanent teaching and non-teaching staff no appointment has been done since last 10 years.
- Due to non-availability of dedicated Examination hall classes are adversely affected during examination period.
- There is a need for more vocational and Add-on courses and better placement opportunities in the college.
- At present time, the Bhojpur region have almost negligible Industrial growth, which resulted into narrow scope of employment generation and Industry Institution interaction, that's why despite all efforts we have not been able to attract too many companies for campus placements.
- The college needs more autonomy and financial support in order to develop with good pace.
- Increased student intake has, so far, not been matched by the expansion of physical infrastructure. This results in cramped classrooms.
- Our repertoire is constrained in terms of academic subject offerings. For example, the College offers almost the entire range of conventional subjects as Honours' & PG courses; however, the emerging fields and application-based courses like bio-technology, Computer Applications, Applied psychology could not be started.
- The IT potential needs to be taken full advantage of more Interactive Board and projectors need to be provided in the classrooms.

- Transport facility lacking.
- Lack of research collaborations.

Opportunities

- There is ample scope for technical /vocational courses to be started in the college so as to make it a better centre of learning & placement.
- Since the college is located in a very influential region, from where several leaders of national repute emerged and contributed immensely to the growth and development of state and the nation, they should be motivated to provide financial and administrative help for the upliftment of college.
- Agro based Research Centres can be established.
- Possibility of collaboration with research institutes and institutions of National importance.
- There are ample opportunities to incorporate ICT & e-learning and other modern methods of education.
- A constant need has been felt for the meaningful alumni connect. Areas where alumni engagement can make significant contributions have already been identified, e.g. curriculum development and delivery, mentoring students, holding visiting sessions, and steering the College ahead through endowments. The College has chalked out certain constructive initiatives in the pipeline, e.g. opening an alumni office for effective communication, issuing a quarterly e-newsletter, starting weekend monthly alumni evenings, allowing the use of infrastructure at concessional rates, organizing sports events, opening global chapters, nominating one Governing Body member from alumni to name a few.

- Increase financial availability.
- To use the low student-teacher ratio to full so that infrastructure is completely and effectively utilized.
- Poor schooling of the students and lack of basic knowledge about the subjects create problem in progress of the curriculum.
- To achieve academic excellence utilizing the services of resource persons and ad-hoc teachers.
- Encouraging research attitude among faculty and students.
- To develop ICT skill among students.
- Mushrooming of non-standard educational / professional institutions in surrounding areas.
- Some of the conventional courses such as philosophy, Sanskrit and Persian are becoming obsolete in the eyes of students because of scarcity of jobs in such discipline. We have the challenge to make those subjects vocationally vibrant and functional.
- To motivate the faculty and university officials to bring change as per the demand of job market in the courses of studies and progressive paradigms in Higher Studies.

Future Plans

- Developing the college into a Centre of Education with Potential of Excellence.
- To establish Agro based Research Centre.
- To develop a good sports complex.
- To start Statutory Professional Regulatory Council's recognized courses such as B.Ed, MCA, MBA, etc.
- Efforts to create consciousness and management of solid and bio disposable wastes.

- To enhance the Alumni inputs and supports towards finance, academics and personal presence.
- To obtain more research project from different funding agencies.



The Principal holds the meetings of the Staff Council, Academic Council, Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) and the Heads of the Departments to develop action plan for effective implementation of the curriculum. In these meetings there are intensive and extensive deliberations. Many strategies and plans, such as Lesion plan, assignments, formative, summative and term tests, discussions, presentations, seminars, workshops, industrial visits, computer educations are evolved apart from regular teaching methods. Academic Action Plan as per the academic calendar issued by the university is prepared in the beginning of the academic session for the whole semester/year by each department. It clearly mentions the part of syllabus to be covered in different terms of semester/year. The progress of the syllabus is monitored through getting the feedback from the students by senior most members of faculty and communicated to the IQAC and the Principal for review.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

University and the college provide facilities to teachers to participate in orientation / refresher courses as well as to participate in seminars and workshops. The University and College also organize seminars and workshop to update the knowledge of faculty members. The institution also provides audio-visual aids like computer, projector, internet and other devices to help them to provide modern teaching aids. The college provides ample books and other teaching and reference material like Journals, magazines, teaching modules and softwares to enable faculty members for effective delivery of curriculum. The Principal provided Laptops to faculties to improve the teaching skill with e-learning by UGC fund on behalf of the college. The heads of the departments maintain healthy interaction with the university teachers in order to improve their teaching practices. The college organizes various departmental seminars, workshops for the teaching members to update their knowledge about latest

emerging trends in their respective disciplines or steams. These supports help in making the curriculum more effective and comprehensive to the faculty and the students. Open source database is accessible in e-Library. College is member of INFLIBNET N-List.

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other Statutory agency.

The following initiatives are taken by the college for effective curriculum delivery provided by the University.

- Apart from giving weightage to the completion of the course in time, the college gives sufficient importance to overall development of students by encouraging them to work with various forums of the college, such as the student council, NSS, NCC, Debating society, Eco-Club and IQAC etc.
- Besides classic teaching tools, i.e. of the chalk & talk, the college faculty members are trained by the B.Sc. (IT) Department to make them familiar with the use of computers so that they can use the modern technological resources like the Internet etc. to invigorate their class room lectures.
- The College has a rich library equipped with latest facilities for the use of teachers and students wherein the latest books and journals are made available to the faculty members and students for their reference.
- In addition to the regular classes, the college also organizes special lectures by inviting experts from various fields to share their knowledge with the students for effective curriculum delivery and their enrichment.
- Educational tours, such as industries/trade fairs, exhibitions & places of historical importance are organized by different faculties from time to time. These provide the students with first-hand knowledge of various components enshrined in the curriculum.
- The college also arranges special/remedial classes for slow/learners (and also for those students, unable to attend the classes on account of NCC camp, NSS camp, social welfare or participation in sports or extracurricular activities to make up their loss).

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum?

Industry: The Professional Guidance Career Counselling and Placement Cell invites HRs and concerned officials to facilitate fruitful interaction with the prospective students of the final year of undergraduate and postgraduate streams. Ara is a hub of

sports goods, garment works, valves and sanitation accessories. Therefore industry, academia and student interface is organized from time to time. The students of various faculties viz, BBA, Commerce & Economics are also taken for industrial visits so as to apprise them of the latest developments in their respective areas.

Research Bodies: Resource persons from various fields are invited by various departments to the college to deliver seminars and conduct workshops. These talks play a substantial role in sharpening the critical sensibility and research acumen of the students. The faculty is encouraged to avail research grants in the form of the UGC sponsored major and minor projects. The faculty members attend various seminars and conferences and most of the time present papers also.

University: The College-University interface benefits the faculty in a number of areas. The teachers make the best possible use of university libraries and journals. In addition to this renowned professors from different universities, research bodies and organizations share their expertise with the teachers and students in various faculties. This exchange goes on throughout the academic session as per the plan and schedule prepared by IQAC. The members of faculties are encouraged to upgrade their teaching skills by participating in Refresher Courses/General Orientation Courses/Short Term Courses at various Academic Staff Colleges of reputed universities.

1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University?(number of staff members/departments represented on the Board of Studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, stakeholder feedback provided, specific suggestions etc.

An effective curriculum is always evolving and roping in the new and relevant stuff. The functioning of university academic bodies ensures the participation of college teachers as they are the ones who know the difficulties of translating the curriculum in practice. The heads of the departments invite feedback on the curriculum and make sure that it is communicated at the Board of Studies meetings.

The yardstick of measuring the relevance of curriculum is the response of the students and alumni. The faculty members make it a point to emphasize the portions of the syllabi where the students show signs of rapid learning and attempt to eliminate the muddled and obscure concepts. The feedback not only of the present students, but also of the old students is constantly kept in mind while seeking modifications. Moreover, the views of other stakeholders are collected through parent teacher meetings and alumni association.

The College strictly adheres to the university charter; therefore, the curricula taught in the College as part of full-fledged degree programmes are those that have been instituted by the university.

1.1.8. How does institution analyze/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

The College has a systematized mechanism for analysing and ensuring that the objectives of the curriculum both in letter and spirit are being adequately and consistently met. The institution functions through the committee system for this.

- As per directive of the committee (IQAC), guidelines are issued to teachers providing a time frame to cover the syllabus and its internal assessment component. These are also incorporated in the printed college calendar that is given to the faculty at the commencement of the academic session.
- Each department meets at the close of the session to distribute courses to be taught in the forthcoming academic session. This gives teachers ample time to prepare their teaching plan and strategies as well as to fill any lacuna in their knowledge.
- At the commencement of the academic session, teachers meet to formally take charge of their time tables and teaching courses.
- Each department has a Moderation Committee that oversees the internal assessment and ensures that parity is maintained in evaluation
- The Monitoring Committee reviews the compliance with internal assessment and other regulations.
- Monthly records of students' attendance are mandatorily submitted in the office and uploaded on the website.
- Department wise review of examination results is done both at the department level and at the level of the College in association with the principal and corrective measures are taken as necessitated. Teachers themselves engage in introspection and self-improvement based on feedback from students and suggestions from peers and superiors. Wherever necessary remedial classes and extra classes are organized.

1.2 Academic Flexibility

1.2.1 Specifying the goals and objectives give details of the certificate/diploma/ skill development courses etc., offered by the institution.

The college is keen to realize that a vast number of students are in need of certificate/diploma/skill development courses to avail job opportunities in relatively shorter span of time owing to their pressing economic needs. To cater to the needs of such students the college has started enrichment program such as IT Exposure, e-Commerce, personality building and soft skill development, which give our students an edge in different fields of employment.

(Self Financed) Vocational Degree course in BBA, B.Sc.(IT)

Offering B.Sc.(IT) degree a three year course structured and designed at par with the career and placement opportunities in several private as well as public sectors concerns such as Banks, Rly, Insurances etc.

(UGC Sponsored) Remedial Courses:

For those students belonging to SC, ST, OBC and Minority Categories who are lagging behind the pace of curriculum.

Aimed to fill the gap between basic understanding of these students and demand of the ongoing curriculum.

General stream students & all the teaching & non-teaching staff are given computer training to make them up to date as per the work-place demand in each & every sector.

As per the statutes of V.K.S.U, Ara, there is no provision for pursuing dual degree programmes simultaneously, and therefore, the college does not offer any such programme.

We are providing Undergraduate (Gen. and Vocational) and Postgraduate course in Humanities, Social Sciences, Science and Commerce with the limited scope of flexibility as per the university rule. As per stipulation of the university, a student having 45 Percent marks in aggregate is eligible for honours courses of studies. He/She can opt. for three years honours program along with two subsidiary subjects one language subject for two consecutive years. Thus a student take a total of eight honours papers, two subsidiaries and one language paper. Non Hindi students have option to opt. English as optional subsidiary paper of both 100 and 50 marks respectively.

The following are the courses/ programs offered by the college with mentioned flexibility:

Choice Based Credit System and range of subject options:

The courses are offered by Veer Kunwar Singh University, Ara (Bihar). Credit system is not followed by our affiliating university. Students enjoy freedom in the selection of subject combination with certain limitations.

Courses offered in modular form: Courses are provided unit wise by University. There is no provision to arrange in the modular form.

Credit transfer and accumulation facility: As affiliating university do not follow the credit system, there is no credit transfer and accumulation facility in college. There is no existing guideline to transfer the credit to another programme.

Lateral and vertical mobility within and across programmes and courses:

No lateral mobility within and across the programme exists.

Enrichment courses: The existing courses are enriched by preparing the students for presentations related skills. We also organize debate, Seminar, Group Discussion and Quiz etc. time to time to update the knowledge of our students.

1.2.4 Does the institution offer self-financed programmes? If 'yes', list them and indicate how they differ from other programmes, with reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification, salary etc.

The Self-finance course B.Sc.(IT) & BBA is other than the traditional programmes in matters of admission curriculum, fee structure, teacher's qualification and salary etc.

These vocational and other traditional programmes in matters of admission curriculum fee structure, teacher qualification and salary etc. as follows:

<u>Admission</u>: Admission in traditional programmes prescribed by the affiliating university is taken on merit basis (marks obtained in the previous qualifying exam.) while in self financed courses admission is taken on the basis of entrance test exams.

<u>Curriculum</u>: Course curriculum of self-finance programme is designed by the syllabus committee being constituted by university on the basis of guideline of UGC and then it is approved by the academic council of the university and regulation and draft of ordinance is accented by Governor's secretariat State govt. B.Sc.(IT) is running here under semester system.

<u>Fee structure</u> : Since all the expenses are to meet with the revenue collected from the learners and some percentage are also for transfer to university. The course fee are far more than the traditional courses. The fee structure is decided by the implementation and monitoring committee of the university in consultation with the college. Presently course fee of B.Sc.(IT) is Rs 9000.00 per semester.

<u>**Teacher Qualification</u></u> : Teachers engaged in this course are minimum M.Sc(IT), MCA degree holder, Senior teachers of allied subject, research scholars and industrial stakeholders of the concerned fields are also engaged as resource persons for teaching</u>**

- learning processes.

<u>Salary:</u> Since teachers engaging these courses are either part-time, contractual or resource person, their honorarium are decided by the vocational Advisory committee of college and they are fixed as per UGC norms on per class or consolidated monthly remunerations.

1.2.5 Does the college provide additional skill oriented programmes, relevant to regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide details of such programme and the beneficiaries.

The institution is alive to the fast changing job scenario in the regional, national and global arena and recognizes the need to equip the students with additional soft skills and capabilities. Professional and skill development courses at undergraduate and postgraduate level are offered to enable the students to meet the challenges in getting employment and to enhance their knowledge. Various courses like communication skills, computer basics and personality development are provided to students to hone their interpersonal skills. The PG department of English, through School of Communication Skills & Personality Development, organized free certificate course for Spoken English, Communication Skills and Personality Development in 2015 and 2016 in which 30 students participated from various streams. There is also a very good tradition in the college that our bright students lend a helping hand to the weak students. The college encourages Peer Learning Culture. Besides, remedial classes also resolve the problems of weak students. It is worth mentioning that no extra fee is charged by the college for such classes. In an attempt to provide sagacious career counseling, quality coaching and exclusive guidance for various Central level -UPSC (Union Public Service Examinations) and State level-SSC (Staff Selection Commission) written exams and interviews of IAS, PCS, Bank POs and Clerical Cadre, Income Tax Inspectors, Railways and Insurance sector Competitive Examinations.

1.2.6 Does the University provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional faceto-face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose the courses/combination of their choice" If 'yes', how does the institution take advantage of such provision for the benefit of students?

No, the university does not permit such flexibility of combining conventional face-toface and distance mode of education although full-time students are free any course of their choice in Distance mode.

- Each department regularly organizes talks by eminent scholars and experts in various disciplinary areas in order to enhance the learning of students beyond the curriculum and in keeping with the dynamic changes in each discipline. This is supplemented by seminars, workshops, field trips, etc. organized by the departments.
- The College's vibrant student democracy and extra-curricular life also add to the student's classroom learning and help to connect the campus to the University, community, employment market and global academia.
- Details of all the above enhancements to student's experience, as well as discussion of the philosophy and structure of this interconnectivity, are available in Criterion VII. Remedial classes for underprivileged students and the slow learners are conducted.
- Scholarships are provided to needy students to enable them to continue their education unimpeded.
- Apart from the teachings the prescribed syllabus, lectures on current affairs are delivered in the classes so that the students remain in sync with the changing world.
- Camps and Seminars like, prevention of Child Labour, Blood Donation Camp, AIDS Awareness etc. organized from time to time under the banner of NSS to address the needs of society.
- Qualitative teaching-learning method is adopted with the help of computer & internet.
- Well-equipped laboratories with modern facilities are made available.
- ICT enabled library with best books, journals, magazines, e-resources is made available through INFLIBNET.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

- The College as an institution and the teachers at the individual level spare no efforts in organizing activities that can act as enrichment for the curriculum.
- Teachers also often use power point presentations for teaching along with the traditional chalk and talk methods to enhance the interest in learning.
- The College has a well-stocked library with extra readings and references beyond the prescribed syllabi.
- There has been a spurt in the number of students undertaking summer projects and internship with industry with the help and guidance of teachers

and the concerned societies, and this develops their personality also.

- The College fosters active relationships with key leaders of industry and innovation, especially through its highly successful programs of on-campus skill- development events, job fairs, lectures and interactions, internships, and job recruitment. The student societies Abhyas (internships) and Disha (placement) are prime movers in this regard.
- Almost in every subject, the college is represented by senior teachers as a member in the Board of Studies, who play an active role in designing the syllabus of both at UG and PG levels by giving suggestions on the basis of inputs from the students and society regarding modification of the curriculum.
- The teachers seek feedback from students while interacting with them and informally advise them in meeting the challenges of the dynamic employment market. The students are instructed as to how they orient themselves to the needs of the employment market.
- Training needs of the students in various courses of study are met with functional mechanisms. Post-graduate science students are taken to educational tours to the advance centres of learning where they are exposed to frontier areas of study and challenges before the scientific community.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

- All these issues ranging from Gender sensitization, Climate change, Environment Education, Human Rights, ICT etc, find place in the curriculum of some course or other. For example, a foundation course on Environment is purportedly designed to create awareness on climate changes, global warming and related environmental concern. Similarly, Gender issues are formalized in Human Rights are covered in political science. ICT is part of the curriculum for students opting for Science and Information Technology as subject.
- The debates and seminars are organized on the momentous issues like Environment education, Climate Change and Women Empowerment, in the college.

Gender

- It is worth repeating, as said in the College's mission and vision statement, that gender sensitivity is among its key principles, as is evidenced by its inception as a co-educational college right from its inception in the nineteenth century. Today, the NSS and NCC units of the College take up issues pertaining to gender, health and human rights.
- The H D Jain College chapter of the National Service Scheme (NSS) has an exemplary record of community service activities. It has a very high enrolment and participation rate among students.
- The Women's Empowerment Cell of H D Jain College (WEC) is committed to

nurture the strength of female students as well as to create a sensitized environment leading to gender equality. Human resource development and awareness programmemes on issues relating to gender discrimination, women's right and empowerment are key functions of the Cell. The Cell endeavours to involve both male and female students in its information dissemination and sensitization activities, so as to foster a healthy man-woman relationship based on mutual trust, respect and co-operation. On average, more than a 100 students register for the WEC per year.

- The Cell has successfully organized a plethora of seminars, panel discussions and interactive sessions on various issues varying from women empowerment to gender discrimination.
- Self-defense workshops have been organized in the College in association with Bihar Police (2014,2015)

Climate Change and Environmental Education: The College is committed to, and continuously striving towards, the ideal of a green campus.' To this end, it has developed a holistic and integrated approach to campus management, involving both student participation through ecological societies, and administrative contributions. The College has integrated mechanisms for sustainability, ranging from solar lights to solid waste management. Also practiced are tree plantation, waste disposal and eco-friendly gardening, reduction of carbon footprint, energy conservation and use of renewable energy.

The administration and students in synergy, also makes constant innovations towards managing the campus as a space for thoughtful and aware co-existence with nature.

The ecological societies of the College are extremely active and popular. Their efforts both evidence the success of the College's commitment to environmental education, and generate such education and awareness for the rest of the College's members. Further, the NSS and NCC Cell of the College regularly organizes cleanliness drives in the College Campus, and participated in the Swachh Bharat Abhiyan. Human Rights

- The NSS Wing of the College focuses its activities on three key sectors of providing equal rights, access and opportunities to the underprivileged and/or differently-abled: education, health, and work with the visually challenged.
- Volunteers are assigned to act as readers and scribers for the visually impaired students of the College to assist them with their academics and examinations.
- NSS volunteers have collaborated with a number of NGOs and external organizations, including Save the Quest (self-reliance for the visually challenged), celebrated White Cane Day (15 October 2015), to mark the achievements of the visually impaired and to pledge never to discriminate on the basis of disability.
- NSS educates students and society regarding many issues like health, sanitation, palliation, etc. Various health camps and cleanliness drives across campus and slum areas near it have been taken out to create awareness and also to motivate people to work towards a clean environment. They have been

conducting free medical camps at various Dalit Tolas in Ara.

ICT

- The College has developed One well-equipped ICT laboratories for student's use. Teachers are also provided laptops for use. In 2015 a week long computer literacy workshop was conducted in the College to help students in using new technology.
- The Science Forum of H D Jain College was instituted by a group of inspired students and devoted faculty members to pursue science outside the classrooms and to facilitate open dialogue between the science departments of the College taking along social sciences and humanities. Acknowledging the significance of interdisciplinary research, the forum regularly organizes talks and seminars of inter disciplinary nature.

1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?

- moral and ethical values
- employable and life skills
- better career options
- community orientation

In order to ensure holistic development of students, we take recourse to the following measures:

Moral and ethical values: The College is very sincere about the moral and ethical values of the students to gear-up the moral and ethical values among the students. The college organizes various programmes on the eve of Republic Day, Independence Day College Establishment Day etc. Apart from these, the volunteers of NSS visit the downtrodden area of the city to educate and empower the people with high moral and ethical sense.

- NCC, NSS and Women's Development Cell of the College provide a solid moral foundation for students and channelize their energy into meaningful causes.
- The College maintains anti-smoking and clean environment concerns.
- The College observes a zero tolerance policy towards ragging and sexual harassment. Students, teachers and all staff are made to feel completely secure on the campus.
- Human values and diversity among students are respected and H D Jain College has students and faculty from diverse socio-economic and regional backgrounds.

Employable and life skills The College offers short-term courses to develop employability and life skills among the students. H.D. Jain College, Ara has established the Centre for Professional Excellence which provides the students of all disciplines. Besides, the centre organizes special lectures on personality development, Leadership development, Computer Skills and Writing Skill for the benefit of the students.

Better career options: The College has placement and career guidance cell to provide information to the students on their career options. Besides, it also arranges expert lectures on career options for the students. The College also offers coaching classes for entry in Govt. jobs.

Community Orientation: The College has a separate wing for institutional social responsibility. Under this banner, the College undertakes with the involvement of students many social and community activities like AIDS awareness program, blood donation camps, awareness on social evils like untouchability, unhygienic environment, drug addiction, alcoholism, etc. NCC, NSS and Youth Red Cross Society are also very active in undertaking many community activities, thereby inculcating a sense of responsibility particularly in the students and the staff, towards community development.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

IQAC takes initiatives in Curriculum Enrichment and Curriculum Revision not only on the basis of feedback of all stakeholders but also by benchmarking with national and international curriculum models in thrust areas and interdisciplinary areas.

- These inputs are submitted to Affiliating University for consideration while revising the curriculum.
- These inputs received through various stakeholders become the basis for conception, development and design of many value added in house programs implemented to enrich the existing curriculum.

Some of these initiatives are:

- B.Sc.(IT) course was suggested to subsequently integrated with the curriculum.
- Data Analytics for UG & PG.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The enrichment programmes are repeatedly tested for their efficacy and modified as the need arises. The HODs work together with IQAC and the other faculty members and monitor these programmes. These programmes are rated according to their utility in developing the potential of the students and increasing their chances of employability. The Principal and the Management take a keen interest in the implementation of these programmes.

1.4 Feedback System

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

The College is an Affiliated Institution of Veer Kunwar Singh University, Ara and therefore do not perform a significant role in curriculum design and development as this task is accomplished by the Board of Studies constituted by the Affiliating University. However, the College strives to contribute its might to the design and development of the curriculum as detailed below:

- Since H D Jain College Ara is premier College of V K S U having PG teachings since long in almost all subjects, the college contributed to the Curriculum Development by deputing Faculty members to serve as Members of Board of Studies (BOS) set up by University. As members of Board of Studies some of our faculty members could directly impact the BOS in developing as well as revising the Course Curriculum. For example: Our faculty members are on the BOS of Physics, Botany, Geography, English and Vocational subjects.
- Our Curriculum Action Plan and Implementation Committee submits recommendations to the BOS of Affiliating University after consulting students, teachers and industry experts and other stake holders;
- Individual Departments have conducted workshops on 'Curriculum Review' and the proceedings of these meetings were also sent to University as suggestions for Curriculum Revision.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

Yes, the institution receives regular feedback from students (Mainly Informal) and their parents by organizing Students-Parent-Teachers meeting. The institution has set up a committee for this purpose. Feedbacks are also obtained from the students through Grievance Redressal Cell and Students' unions. Each teacher submits a progress report at the end of every month that helps the administration to evaluate the progress in teaching. The academic council of the college reviews teaching practices of the teachers and the feedback is transmitted through the IQAC coordinator of the Institution. Complaint Box has been installed at various places in the college campus to receive accurate feedback from students they are also encouraged to give feedback through college's website. The college is planning to develop a feedback procedure on the students' experience of the course of study from the current academic session regarding teaching and learning progresses.

2.1 Student Enrollment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The College has constituted an admission committee which takes care of the admission process. Information regarding choice of courses available in UG & PG sections, Eligibility Criteria for Individual courses, Duration of the course structure, Curriculum, Faculty, Infrastructure etc are made available through

Publicity in the admission process taken by the college:

- Prospectus, Individual Course leaflets and college notice board.
- College Website (www.hdjaincollege.org)
- Advertisements through Print & Electronic media

Transparency in the admission process:

- Applications received, both through online platforms and directly from students, are screened on the bases of Merit in the qualifying exam along with roster considerations, after which the selected applications are displayed in First, Second & Final Lists on notice boards within the campus and on college website.
- The Eligibility Criteria, Commencement of the admission process, Last dates for admissions are strictly followed in alignment with the guidelines and notices given by the Affiliating University.
- The reservation policy of State Government is strictly followed in the admission process.
- The preferences are given to NSS, NCC, Sports and Cultural Quota students also.
- The college has computerized admission system for transparency in admission.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.

Admissions to the College under all the different categories are purely on the basis of merit of qualifying exam. and no interview or written test is conducted for traditional courses such as B A (Hons.), B Sc (Hons), B Com. (Hons) M A and M Sc, entrance test and interview are conducted for admission in Vocational courses B Sc (IT) and BBA. Admissions are done within the structure of rules, regulations, and procedures stipulated by the V K S University of Ara. The qualifying examinations for the purpose of admission to the first year of undergraduate courses offered by the College is the class XII exam passed from any recognaised Senior Secondary examination Board of India. Candidate seeking admission should have passed the qualifying

examination obtaining minimum marks as specified for each of the courses. The criteria adopted and the admission processes are outlined below:

- The minimum eligibility criteria for each Honours course is 45% minimum in aggregate and also 45% in the subject opted for Honours. Admission-in-charges of each department and the Principal finally take decision regarding merit list. These are notified in both the college and university websites, in notice boards in the college, and also covered by newspapers.
- The admissions under the sports and extra-curricular categories are done as per the guidelines given by the University. The final selection of candidates under these categories is done by statutory committees that consist of both college and university representatives, as well as eminent experts/sportspersons.
- The admission committee of college scrutinize the received applications, and admission is based on pre-determined criteria and schedules that are widely notified. The candidates in sports category are given points for their achievements as per the criteria given by the University, and the same is notified on the university website. Selection is on the basis of both merit and skill, the latter evaluated through fitness tests/ event trials for admissions based on sports, and trials/auditions for admissions based on extra-curricular achievements conducted by these committees.
- Admissions under the Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes, Backward Castes (under annexure I and II), and Persons with Disabilities categories are done on the basis of separate eligibility criteria within the framework of the university guidelines on admissions.
- The V K S University allots courses and colleges for admission of wards of defense personnel injured/killed in war, and Kashmiri migrants through a centralized process, and the College has no discretion in these admissions.
- Admissions to the post-graduate courses are also done by the departments concerned on the basis of merit of graduation in the subject which is to be taken in PG.

2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.

The eligibility for admission to this college is 45% marks in the qualifying degree (Intermediate for admission at Degree level and B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. for admission at Postgraduate level) as prescribed by the University. Though, the cut off marks in this college is usually high. As our college is the first choice for admission for students and guardians of this town. First choice of this town is H.D. Jain College, Ara, Second Maharaja College, Ara and third choice is S B College, Ara so cut off marks in this college is always high in comparison to other colleges of the district.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

- During the admission process itself review is done prior to bringing out the subsequent cut-off list.
- This is done by each department individually and then within the central admission committee along with the principal before releasing the subsequent admission list.
- Further, grievance cell constituted during admissions helps resolve students concerns even as the admissions are ongoing. The admission process is reviewed in a Staff Council meeting every year. The College Admission Committee reports the admissions for approval. Suggestions are noted to improve the process for the following year. Such meetings have streamlined the process of admission in the College and have shaped a satisfactory merit based admission procedure.

H D Jain College, Ara keeping with the cherished values with which the College was established, has always adopted a proactive and empathetic approach towards economically and socially deprived students.

The College strictly adheres to the reservation policy of the Government of Bihar and the V K S University, Ara for SC/ST/BC-I/BC-II/BCW students and the students belonging to other minorities, and encourages them without any prejudice. Students belonging to economically weaker sections receive financial support by the students' welfare department Govt. Bihar in the form of cash back of the tuition fee.

- a) SC / ST: Reservation quota as fixed by Central/State govt. and subsequently by V.K.S.U, Ara is followed, it is in manner: SC : 16% ; ST : 01% .
- b) **BC-I** / **EBC** : 18% of the intake capacity is reserved for students belonging to castes identified under BC-I / Extremely Backward Category by State govt. (Bihar).
- c) **BC** –II : 12% of the intake capacity is reserved for students belonging to castes identified under Backward Category Annexure –II by State govt. (Bihar).
- d) **Differently abled:** 03% of the intake capacity is reserved for differently abled students as per state govt. (Bihar) rules. We also provide facilities such as ramps for the convenience of physically challenged students.
- e) BCW : 01% of the intake capacity is reserved for backward class women candidate.
- f) In addition to the above mentioned reservation policies framed by Central/State govt. (Bihar) and affiliating university, college. Admission committee has framed following additional (Over and Above) reservation policy.
- Donors' Nominee -02%
- Dependents of teaching staff of college and university Departments -05%
- Wards of transferable Central/State govt. employees such as Rly., Bank, Army Personnel -05%
- Excellent performers in Sports/Games/Music/Fine Arts -04%
- Girls candidates are awarded with 5% weightage on aggregate marks.

g) Economically Weaker Sections

Exclusive freeship and other liberal concessions are given to the candidates of economically weaker sections of the society. Candidates belonging to this segment of society, even with minimum required percentage of the university, are admitted for admission, if the seats are available. The students belonging to these strata of society are also allowed to pay the fee in easy installments.

The trend of admission definitely shows decline in the entry in language courses and Philosophy. Interest of students towards vocational courses and some of traditional courses such as His., Pol. Sc., Eco., Geo., and Science subject is high. This is part of a larger trend in the higher education across the country.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently- abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The College strictly adheres to all the policies and initiatives taken by the government, the UGC, and the University towards differently-abled students. In addition, the institution actively promotes the interests and welfare of these students with special needs/demands by ensuring a physical and academic environment that enables them to access equally all the facilities provided by the College, and to avail of all the choices and opportunities that the institution offers.

- The College reserves 3% of offered seats for candidates with disabilities. Candidates applying under the PwD category should have a minimum 30% disability. (PwD : Person with Disability)
- The College implements all the guidelines/procedures stipulated by the Equal Opportunities Cell (EOC) of the College.
- No tuition fees are charged from differently-abled students, and dedicated study material is made available free of cost
- The college has established academic support structures that include technological support, provision of reading and scribe services, and special faculty support in the form of designated teachers from each department to assess the academic needs and progress of these students on a regular basis, and organize special tutoring services according to their requirements.
- All the PwD students on campus are provided access to the internet through an effective Wi-Fi network.
- The institution has constructed differently-abled friendly toilets.
- To the fullest extent possible, the College tries to ensure that classes are held on the ground floor for differently-abled students with special needs.
- Additional time is provided for students with disabilities, and special assistance in the form of readers/writers, separate rooms etc. are provided by the institution as permitted by the University.
- The NSS volunteers provide the PwD students with help in reading the prescribed texts, the writing of assignments, internal assessment, and caters to other academic needs of the students.
- Each PwD student has been assigned a set of volunteers who work according to a strict time-table. The needs of the PwDs and the work of the volunteers is monitored by the NSS Program officer on a weekly basis.

Other aspects of intervention by the Enabling Unit include:

- Providing counseling to differently-abled students on the types of courses they could study at the higher education institutions.
- Ensuring admission of as many differently-abled students as possible through the general category, and also through the reservation meant for them.
- Creating awareness amongst differently-abled persons regarding fee concessions, examination procedures, reservation policies, etc., pertaining to differently-abled persons.
- Assessing the educational needs of persons with disabilities enrolled in the college and providing them with the required type of assistive devices.
- Sensitizing the students, faculty, and other staff of the college regarding issues pertaining to disability.
- Studying the aptitude of differently-abled students and assisting them in getting appropriate employment after their studies.
- Celebrating important days pertaining to disability such as the World Disabled Day, White Cane Day, etc., in the college in order to create awareness about the capabilities of differently-abled persons.
- Ensuring maintenance of special assistive devices procured by the college and encouraging differently-abled persons to use them for enriching their learning experiences.
- Encouraging differently-abled persons to participate in inclusive sports and cultural activities organized by the college.
- Ensuring that every department of the college designates a teacher to monitor the academic progress of these students and look after their specific needs.
- Promoting and monitoring the developing of disability-friendly infrastructure on campus.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

The College attracts students with diverse socio-economic and cultural profiles and the institution has several mechanisms/processes in place to evaluate their needs and abilities and provide compensatory support structures.

- The variations in the minimum eligibility criteria serves as an indicator of the level of additional academic support that is required for students admitted under special categories.
- The College organizes departmental-level orientation programmes on the first day of the academic session for the newly admitted students. During the long interaction students are made conversant of the philosophy of the institution, course structure and other aspects of the curriculum, the assessment mechanisms for different courses, attendance rules and other academic requirements of the institution, the different facilities for co-curricular and extra-curricular activities and so on.
- Members of the faculty make an informal assessment about the students'

requirements and skills in terms of a number of parameters.

- The Enabling Unit assesses the educational needs of persons with disabilities enrolled in the College and provides them with the specific types of assistive devices/facilities they require.
- The Special Categories Counseling Cell continuously observes the admission process and provides, after an assessment of the candidate's knowledge and skills, guidance in respect of choice of programmes, career options, facilities and support structures functioning in the College.
- Language competencies are continually assessed during the teaching-learning process and the College provides English Language Proficiency Courses at the basic level, with the help of Department of English.
- The College provides, subject to the constraint of infrastructure, bi-lingual education in courses (Hindi and English) where such an intervention is felt necessary.
- Students' knowledge and requirements are also assessed continually through interactive assessment methods as well as tutorial and other discussions.
- The Library also has evaluative processes in place that ensure that the extensive array of journals, books, computer facilities, and special assistive devices etc., which are required by students with widely diverse profiles, are made available.
- The institution has a distinguished history of sustained cultural activity in drama, debate, music, fine arts, photography, dance and film. These activities are organized through societies, and the informal interaction between students and faculty members in these forums promotes greater awareness of the students' knowledge levels, specific needs and skills.
- Organizations such as the N.C.C. and the N.S.S., clubs such as the cultural society, eco-club debating society etc. also promote greater interface between faculty and students.
- The Career Counseling and Placement Cell of the College is proactive, and continuously initiates programmes to not only identify and develop the potential within the students but also broaden their career profiles.

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

A large chunk of students in our college hails from suburban areas located nearby to college. Large section of students comes from such families where education exposure is almost absent, where parents have never given importance to education. As a result these students do not have sound base. To bring such students at par with other students special bridge the knowledge gap classes are arranged for them. For mediocre students, we arrange remedial classes, particularly for SC/ST/OBC and General Category students, having poor base are also allowed to participate in remedial classes to enhance their skills and competence. Personality development, Leader ship

development writing skills Spoken English classes are also arranged for these students to inculcate confidence. Mentors counsel them regarding importance of body language, accent and positive approach that are required in day to day life.

- The College, from the very beginning, organizes remedial classes in the afternoons for all undergraduate courses, for students who are lagging behind in the curriculum to bring them at par with the others. They are constantly encouraged and their progress is regularly monitored to get the desired improvement.
- Reticent students are also especially encouraged to come forward to make classroom presentations and to participate more actively in discussions.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The college takes the following steps to sensitize the staff and students on the above mentioned issues:

- A Woman Empowerment Cell has been constituted in our college with the basic aim to enhance the awareness of female students about their rights and legal protection available to them.
- For gender sensitization the college regularly arranges counseling for the students.
- The college regularly arranges special lectures by eminent scholars, social activists and educationists under its NSS& NCC programmes
- Topics like legal rights of women, prevention of sexual harassment, and gender related issues such as female infanticide, dowry menace, and gender discrimination are regularly discussed on various platforms in the campus.
- The Eco-Club and NSS, organizes plantation drives, nature walks, paper recycling campaigns and workshops to increase awareness among students and College staff about the environment and the need for its protection.
- The College organizes anti-tobacco, prohibition of liquor consumption campaigns to increase awareness of the ill-health caused by smoking and liquor consumption.
- Many gender based issues confronting society are also tackled through Nukkad Nataks (street plays) of the Cultural club.
- The College has an Internal Complaints Committee in place to address complaints related to sexual harassment. Cast category discrimination.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

In every department of the College there is constant interaction between the faculty and the students, both within and outside the classrooms. Lectures, project presentations, and group discussions take place within classrooms, while tutorial discussions, teacher-student dialogue on student performances in assignments/tests, interaction within departmental committees/ societies and during the organization of seminars/ workshops take place in departmental rooms and other assigned spaces. This constant interface within the teaching-learning process enables identification of attributes such as academic aptitude, interest in further learning, keenness for assuming additional responsibilities, the ability to take the initiative, and the capacity to resolve difficulties.

The needs and potential of advanced learners, as identified by the above processes, are addressed and developed by the following;

- At the level of each department, members of the faculty provide more advanced academic material, encourage individual presentations, and promote discussions on a wide range of current issues/developments relevant to wider aspects of the curriculum. Advanced learners are also encouraged to provide support to slower learners.
- Advanced learners are encouraged to work in small research/innovation/special projects both within and outside the immediate curriculum.
- The Placement Cell is proactive, and constantly initiates programmes to not only identify and develop the potential within these students but also broaden their career rofiles.
- Abilities such as providing leadership and initiative, working co-operatively within a team, assuming responsibilities, and resolving conflict situations are identified and developed by a wide array of co-curricular and extra-curricular societies /committees /clubs/ organizations such as departmental and inter-disciplinary societies, NSS, NCC, Adventure and Eco clubs, sports and cultural societies.
- The College library has an extensive collection of books, journals, reports to broaden student horizons.
- These students are encouraged to contribute in terms not only to write but also assume editorial responsibilities in the College magazines.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

- Analysis of academic performance of students is done through mentors who are assigned to each class of students. The Mentors collect data and inputs from other associating teachers through the monitoring of performance in formal and informal tests, participation in curricular and non-curricular activities. The Mentors keep track of the overall academic performance of the students, thereby creating a database of inputs.
- The College also has an active attendance monitoring system which is analyzed and reviewed regularly. Trends of absenteeism are picked out, thus also identifying potential dropouts in the process.
- The identified students and their parents/guardians are counseled and approached to ascertain the reasons causing absenteeism & poor academic performance. Post

this exercise, additional support is extended to students from genuinely disadvantageous backgrounds both in the forms of **added academic support like special remedial classes and**

economic support such as fee waivers, delayed fee payment options as may be necessary. All these measures have enabled us as an Institution to actively engage in minimizing dropout rates.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

The College has a structured approach to plan and organize teaching, learning & evaluation schedules, which is being developed and refined on a continuous basis over the years.

Development of Academic Calendar: Based on the academic calendar of the Affiliating University, the academic calendar for the College is prepared by IQAC with help of departmental Heads.

- Course commencement Dates
- Closing dates
- Schedule of Internal Exams for all courses
- Pre-scheduled Conferences and Workshops
- Pre-Scheduled Competency building programs
- Pre-placement training Activities
- Annual Athletic Meet
- Annual Cultural Fest
- Annual Day
- Graduation Day
- Alumni meet
- Schedule of University Examinations
- List of Holidays etc.

Development of teaching plan: Individual faculty members prepare teaching schedules for the assigned papers after taking into consideration the minimum number of teaching hours as prescribed by the Board of Studies. The head of each department, in association with the associating teachers (Department Council) develop departmental Teaching Plans consisting of Course File, Work Diary & Semester Execution Summary. The faculty members also prepare work diaries for each subject wherein period-wise academic delivery has to be mentioned. Teaching plans for classroom as well as laboratory sessions are finalized after taking into consideration, the workload of all the members of the department.

Evaluation Blueprint: The College prepares a schedule for all the periodical internal

examinations to test the learning outcomes of students. Accordingly, internal examinations are conducted at the departmental level by using Blue-Books (answer booklets); the blue books serve as a continuous record that enables continuous tracking of student performance in internal examinations. The evaluated blue books are accessible to students to take advantage of the evaluation criteria as well as to work on the relevant remarks & faculty feedback on student's performance. The specify feedback and suggestions help students to perform better in their future examinations.

Students' Feedback: During the execution of academic plans and at the end of each semester, students' feedback is obtained. These inputs are utilized to refine the teaching plans, wherein, special classes and additional doubt-clearing sessions are organized to enable students perform better in their academic endeavors.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

The College has an IQAC for conscious, consistent and catalytic improvement in the overall performance of the Institution. The IQAC at HDJC strives towards quality initiative, quality sustenance and quality enhancement of academic activities in the college

IQAC contribute to teaching and learning process indirectly.

- (i) The role of IQAC is important in infrastructural developments, periodic upgradation of class rooms and examination and evaluation reforms.
- (ii) Motivating faculty members periodically to attend programmes on new and emerging technologies.
- (iii) The problems faced by the students and teachers are raised at appropriate platforms so that it can be resolved.
- (iv) Feedback on courses and faculty is also obtained to assure quality of teaching & learning.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

College offers a lot of support services to its teachers for making learning student centric. College has a rich library with latest editions of different books. Our college has e-library facility that keep our students connected to different libraries of the world. Our college is the active members of the INFLIBNET programmes of the UGC. Students can read different books; download the chapters anytime from anywhere. Teaching aids like LCD projectors, smart board are used by teachers to make their lectures more attractive and easy to understand. Time to time GD, Seminar and Debate are organized to interact students regarding the topics that teachers have taught in the classroom.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

The College faculty encourage and develop students' abilities to critically examine or access an idea or a situation, and to conceptualize different interpretations of the same idea or situation.

- The College encourages inter-disciplinary innovative projects and interdisciplinary societies to add value to the teaching-learning-process and to nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among students.
- By inculcating creative and adaptive thinking among the students, the teachers prepare them for the challenges of life beyond the classroom. Practices such as classroom and tutorial discussions impart flexibility to classroom teaching and enhance creative thinking among the students.
- The College magazine and departmental wall-magine have both teachers and students on their editorial teams, and both stakeholders contribute to such journals.
- Many departments of the College conduct field studies, excursions, study tours to develop a sense of curiosity and questioning, and to promote logical reasoning. Different departments organize science fairs, science clubs and other events to develop a competence of reasoning and thinking, and also a scientific temperament to apply to daily-life decision-making processes.

Teachers of the College encourage the students to become independent and selfmotivated learners for life. Students are also encouraged to develop habits of dedicating oneself to continuous learning, staying updated with the current events, acquiring new skills, and in analyzing and resolving contradictory pieces of knowledge, thus expanding their understanding.

The faculty of the institution develop an innovative outlook among the students by assigning projects and assignments – both within a discipline and across disciplines - which require application of innovative ideas thereby motivating students to think out of the box and develop new ideas by engaging better with the subject. A teacher-student partnership in a project is extremely beneficial for the latter as they can learn from the experience and expertise of the former, with teachers acting as knowledge advisors to students in innovative projects.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

H D Jain College has 05 ICT-enabled classrooms, making possible for teaching to evolve into a two way, multidimensional process, with greater interactive sessions.

- Online databases, such as SCIENCE DIRECT, JSTOR, PUBMED etc. are made available to students.
- Faculty members enable the students to access useful information by suggesting websites such as e-pathshala (UGC), Sakshat (MHRD), INFIBNET-N-List etc.
- Our College has a well-equipped ICT facility with 01 laboratories having 40 computers as well as LCD projectors, digital sound system, scanners and printers.
- Faculty members feature as Resource Persons for several co-curricular and extra-curricular.
- The College has a fully automated library with OPAC subscriptions to the NLIST (National Library and Information services infrastructure for scholarly content) Programme of the INFLIBNET (Information and Library Network), UGC, and enabling in-house as well as remote access to e-publications. The College is Wi-Fi enabled and has 40 PCs and 10 laptops.
- With these facilities, several faculty members have been able to enhance their teaching methods by incorporation of the following: Power point presentations, demonstrations, use of models, group presentations, educational films and documentaries.
- With the introduction of such technologies and facilities, it has been observed that there is a marked improvement in the communication skills, confidence and overall personality of the students. This materially increases their job prospects.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

In order to expose the students and faculty to advanced level of knowledge and skills, the college takes up the following initiatives:

- Intensive integration of ICT in combination with face-to-face classroom teaching & learning is promoted; this enables students & faculty to have access to advanced level of Knowledge and Skills.
- Conducting regular guest lecturers with distinguished Scientists & Industry Experts provide opportunities for advanced learning.
- Faculty members & students are nominated to participate in National level Seminars & Conferences to advance their knowledge in specify domain areas.
- Extensive collection of Books, Journals & e-Journals in the library and Wi-Fi internet connectivity accessible to all students & faculty has significantly contributed to the exposure to advanced levels of Knowledge & Skills.
- Seminars and guest lectures are organized on regular basis in college campus to update their knowledge. This helps students and faculty members gather information about the latest developments in their fields.
- Newspapers and Internet are used on daily basis to keep track of the latest advancements in a particular field.
- Keeping in mind the advancements in information technology, the college has

moved ahead of its peers by using computers and Internet to teach most of the subjects. The college boast of state-of-the art computer laboratories and Network Resource Centre equipped with Internet.

- Seminars and workshop on burning topics & issues are organized from time to time in college. Prominent scholars and people from university and other organizations are invited to exhibit their pedantry for the benefit of the students.
- Several faculty members attends Refresher courses, orientation programmes and workshops organized and conducted by UGC, university and other organizations.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students \benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring /academic advise) provided to students?

- The Principal and faculty members encourage the students to freely voice their opinions on issues of their concern, and addresses them suitably giving advice and guidance as needed.
- Even outside the classroom, faculty members are always approachable to the students. Individual teachers also mentor and support their students.
- Teachers also guide both academic and co-curricular activities of departmental societies.
- The Placement Cell is a dedicated forum for academic support and guidance and enables students to take crucial career decisions with confidence.
- The College has a psycho-social cell to help students deal with personal, social, academic/non-academic issues.
- The staff advisor of the Equal Opportunity Cell is in constant touch with students, the Principal, University and other stake holders for addressing their needs and providing all possible facilities for their academic growth. Through this cell the students are also able to organize cultural and social festivals, to showcase their varied talents, which are well appreciated by the entire student community.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

The college encourages the faculty to compliment the academic

system with practical skills through various teaching methodologies extending beyond classroom. The activities undertaken during last four years are:

- Power-point presentations and use of internet to make teaching and learning more interactive and interesting.
- Educational trips / Field trips National seminars in many subjects were organized.
- NLIST is subscribed to encourage faculty to adopt new & innovative methods.

- Students are allotted topics to prepare power-point presentations and class seminars are held.
- Students are encouraged to maintain wall magazine.
- CD's of topics and classic movies are shown to students.

The students get an exposure of global scenario of education as well as competition and can prepare themselves for prospective challenges.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

- The College library has a rich collection of Text books, Reference books, Journals, Magazines, and digitized education resources like CDs and DVDs.
- The operations are computerized and driven through standard software, and also provides access to a vast number of e-journals and digitized text books and reference books through INFLIBNET.
- The library has adequate number of computers with Wi-Fi internet access which are used by both students and staff to access Digital Library resources as well as Internet-based content.
- The Library also has reprography facility; the Library remains open from 8 a.m to 6.30 p.m.
- The working hours of the Library are extended during the periods of University Examinations for additional support.
- The Faculty uses the library resources to prepare and develop teaching plans and content.
- Students use the resources for additional classroom learning, assignments, projects, take home exercises, case analysis, role playing, etc.
- The Library resources are also used extensively by the faculty & students to develop and document research proposals and to prepare manuscripts for publication in Research Journals.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

Due to acute shortage of teachers the departments face problems in completing the syllabi. The institution invites part-time and guest teachers to meet the staff shortage to some extent and thus help to complete the syllabi in time. However, the institution manages the delivery of curriculum through lesson plan management system. Every faculty member has to follow the lesson plan management system and update their completion status. This helps in the timely completion of syllabus. However, in case of unscheduled holidays, the classes are re-planned and extra classes are always taken in order to complete the syllabus.

Completing the curriculum requires meticulous planning as the College has a vibrant

matrix of extracurricular activities.

- The College functions within the framework of the academic calendar of the University and College.
- The Academic Calendar of the College provides the broad schedule for the College's curriculum.
- The Timetable Committee provides the parameters within which the Teachers Incharge of various departments prepare the teaching and laboratory schedule thereby ensuring that syllabi are completed on time.
- Compensatory lectures and practical classes are held to compensate any teaching losses due to unforeseen circumstances.
- Extra-curricular Society activities are usually held during late afternoons such that they do not interfere with the teaching schedule.
- Departments are encouraged to conduct their field trips and festivals during the mid-term break to avoid any disruption in the regular teaching schedule.
- Teachers are required to finish the syllabus and internal evaluation according to the College's internal academic calendar, which takes the university calendar into account.
- As with any institution of this size, it is not always possible to control all exigencies. However pre-emptive action combined with compensatory teaching ensures that curricular goals are met in a time bound fashion.
- When any teachers go on leave, ad hoc appointments are done promptly without any delay so that teaching can continue uninterrupted. Under short term contingency scenarios, guest lecturers are also appointed. The College administration ensures that the classes are held on time and syllabi are completed.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

- The institute monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching learning through IQAC which collects feedback from all stakeholders and on the basis of such feedback, monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching-learning. These analyzed and evaluated, reports are perused by the Principal. In turn the outcome of the feedback analysis is informed to each teacher for future improvement and encouragement. The outcome of the evaluation and its analysis are intimated to the individual teachers to understand their strength and weaknesses, leading to overall improvement of the teaching-learning process.
- The Principal and IQAC coodinator regularly meets the Heads of Departments and takes feedback on the teaching-learning progress of each department.
- Besides, the College Grievance Redressal Mechanism also takes care of the quality of teaching-learning.

2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human

resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum

This college is fortunate to attract the best available faculties in the university for each subject. Our academic work culture is sound and challenging. Each faculty has to contribute in maintaining and upgrading the academic standards. Therefore, only those who have sound knowledge and good communication skill join as faculty of this institute. Even the best among newly appointed teachers (according to merit) prefer to join this college.

The qualified faculty members of this college get utmost job satisfaction obviously due to availability of large number of good students to interact with sound infrastructure, sprawling campus and satisfactory research facility. The composition of faculty members of this college is presented in the following table.

The regular faculty is employed strictly as per UGC, Bihar Government and University rules and conditions. The same eligibility conditions apply to temporary, Part-Time and Guest faculty. Appointment of teachers, whole-time including Principal of affiliated colleges is made in accordance with the provisions of the Bihar Govt. However, if in any subject where faculty strength falls due to retirement of any teacher and the recruitment of new teacher does not take place in time, then the authority takes initiatives to appoint Part-Time Teachers/ Guest Faculty according to the rules and norms laid down by the V K S University, Ara and Department of Higher Education, Government of Bihar, and the rules made there-under.

2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (BBI, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

The College has a long and well-established reputation as an academic institution with strong teaching and research components. The Institution's inherent academic culture juxtaposed with strong support structures provided by the administration enables it to meet the challenge posed by scarcity of qualified senior faculty in emerging areas of study. These include;

- A flexible and ready-to-evolve approach of the faculty towards academic and professional growth. The College encourages the faculty to participate in various Faculty Training and Capacity-Building Workshops and Programmes, refresher courses, Summer and Winter Schools to re-professionalize themselves by acquiring new skills. The College provides leave of absence for academic/research purposes.
- Strong technological and infrastructural support structures are provided by the College (details in sections 4.1 and 4.3)
- The Institution provides specialized laboratories and promotes of state-of-theart hardware and software in its computer systems while continually upgrading laboratory instruments and other apparatus.
- `The Institution facilitates procedures for receiving research grants from funding agencies like UGC/DBT/ICMR/DRDO.
- Any temporary shortfall of teachers is met by guest faculty, and experts are invited to give lectures/talks/seminars for formal and informal interaction with the faculty and students.

2.4.3 Providing details on staff development programmes during the last four years elaborate on the strategies adopted by the institution in enhancing the teacher quality.

a) Nomination to staff development programmes

Apart from nominating the faculty for external academic development programmes,

the College organizes several one-day duration faculty development programmes in a year with outside expert(s). This helps the faculty in updating and enriching their subject knowledge and skills. Workshops are also organized by the College on teaching methods, pedagogy tools, course planning, content development, etc for the benefit of the faculty. The seminars organized by the departments of the College also help the faculty in enhancing their quality of teaching.

Regarding use of audio visual aids/multimedia etc, technical assistance is provided by the College to operate ICT tools.

Strategies adopted by the institution in enhancing the teacher quality.

• The College provides autonomy and infrastructure for learner-centric education approach through appropriate methodologies like Academic Calendar, Interactive & instructional techniques like audio-visual mode of teaching, ICT based learning, organizing seminars, debates, Lectures by experts from other colleges &

Universities, inter-departmental lecture exchange & presentations. This is accompanied by experiential teaching like project-based learning, field work, surveys, experiments and practical classes, etc.

- The College organizes Workshops/ Seminars/ Conferences for enhancing the teacher quality.
- Study materials, reference books, information from Internet are provided.
- The students and the faculty keep pace with recent developments in their disciplines by perusing research journals, latest reference books, participating in national seminars/workshops/symposium /summer school/ refresher courses/internet browsing and interactions with experts.

2.4.4 What policies/systems are in place to recharge teachers? (eg: providing research grants, study leave, support for research and academic publications teaching experience in other national institutions and specialized programmes industrial engagement etc.)

The institution supports and encourages faculty members to broaden their theoretical perceptions and sharpen the methodological tools of the subject concerned. The teachers are encouraged to attend the orientation and refresher courses conducted in various universities across India. Added to it to promote researches the teachers are encouraged to send minor and major research proposals to UGC/CSIR/ICHR/ICSSR. The research awards are definitely instrumental in recharging the faculty members as they engage with new discourses, methodologies prevalent in the respective subject. The college also provides small grants to departments to undertake some specific and extremely relevant research proposals and fieldwork. The teachers who do their Ph.D. are given study leave to complete their work. The teachers are also encouraged to attend seminar and symposiums and the college supports them through granting duty leave and reimburses their travel expenditure. The college is also undertaking efforts to publish a monograph on H D Jain College, Ara and also an academic journal which shall be peer reviewed.

2.4.5 Give the number of faculty who received awards / recognition at the state, national and international level for excellence in teaching during the last four years. Enunciate how the institutional culture and environment contributed to such performance/achievement of the faculty.

The College provides an environment conducive for the faculty to engage in research and other academic pursuits.

The Institution's intrinsic academic culture in conjunction with strong support structures offers many different opportunities for the faculty to grow professionally and ensures minimal constraints for academic pursuits.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

YES. Student feedback is collected regularly to evaluate Teacher's competencies in the Teaching-Learning Process

- Student feedback on individual faculty members is collected in order to assess teaching competencies of teachers, in each paper handled by the teacher.
- Major pointers from the feedback are communicated to the Faculty which has resulted in significant improvement in the quality of the interactions and the Teaching-Learning process.
- Peer review of faculty competencies is also conducted by the Academic Audit Committee (IQAC) consisting of the respective HOD, Principal and external subject experts. In addition, the Recommendations & Observations of Subject Experts who are part of Local Inspection Committee (LIC) of the Affiliating University are also shared with the respective faculty members. This process of External Peer Review also has significantly contributed to the quality enhancement among Teaching Faculty.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

- Detailed information about the evaluation methods and the Examination schedule is given in the Prospectus from the time of their admission in a course and also in the Academic Calendar at the beginning of a session.
- The evaluation methods are displayed in the departmental notice board for different subjects. Regular notification regarding examination is also a feature of the teaching-learning and evaluation process of the institution.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

A major evaluation reform in the UG level examination was the

adoption of multiple-choice based question paper in the final year. Bar code is also being used on Answer Books. The reforms, otherwise, proposed by the university are mandatory at UG and PG level. The institution, on its own, initiates such reforms as internal viva-voce and assignments/assessments in UG and PG practical labs.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The College has introduced a system to maintain separate Blue books for each student, which become tools to monitor Students' academic progression in Internal Examinations.

- The Blue-Book is used as a tool/basis for feedback to students and their guardians and enhances the process of evaluation.
- Faculty members receive special orientation on University Evaluation Reforms as well as Institutional Evaluation Reforms, at the beginning of the semester and also before the commencement of major Evaluation points.
- Students are assisted in documentation seeking re-evaluation from the University Examination/Evaluation Units. Internal Assessment Marks/ Grades are displayed on Notice Boards in the College before they are submitted to University, in order to provide scope for Grievance Redressal.
- Internal Marks/Grades that are given to students are also monitored by the IQAC and the Principal, in order to ensure transparency and promote evaluation based on guidelines and remove instances of personal biasis.
- Any other complaints received from students are forwarded to the University by the College.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

The formative assessment is done to get feedback and information during the instructional process. It measures student progress as well as progress of a teacher. The following are the types of formative assessment in the College.

- Observations of students during in-class activities
- Take home exercises/assignments
- Question and answer sessions
- Student seminars
- Group discussions
- Unstructured interviews
- Student interactive sessions

Summative assessment is done to measure student growth at the end of a course/semester to determine whether learning goals have been met. The following are the summative assessments being carried out in the College.

- Unit tests (Multiple choice, True/False, Short answer, etc)
- Mid-term examinations (Based on University examination model)
- Pre-final examinations (Based on University examination model)

All the above mentioned measures have resulted in top-level performance of the students in their University examinations – For Example: B.A., B.Sc., M.A and M.Sc. B.Com. These efforts have also yielded prestigious University Ranks in University Examination in the subjects like M.Sc., Applied, Chemistry, B.Sc. (IT), BBA etc.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.

- Complete transparency is maintained during the evaluation process and all the stakeholders remain well informed about the methodology adopted for internal assessment.
- While 20% marks are kept for academic assessment of the students, 5% marks are earmarked for attendance. The attendance record is submitted to the office at the end of each month. To keep teachers aware of the submission dates the College has an academic calendar in place.
- The graded answer scripts are shown to each and every student of the class and discussed in detail.
- Every student also has access to the Internal Assessment data available with their department. This helps in expediting the redressal of grievances of students, if any, pertaining to their Internal Assessment.
- The Internal Assessment data generated by various departments is verified by IQAC.
- The Academic Calendar ensures that at least 50% of the course is covered and 50% Internal Assessment submitted in the office by the end of mid-term.
- Since the University ordinances and guidelines do not have provisions for evaluating behavioral aspects of a student's performance, no such procedures can be put in place by the College. However, attempts are made to recognise class participation, performance in discussions; presentations, etc.

2.5.6 What are the graduates attributes specified by the college/affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

A graduate degree is awarded by the V K S University upon the completion of the prescribed curriculum and the attainment of the minimum prescribed marks for the programme/ course in the aggregate of both term-end examinations and Internal Assessment components. The College emphasizes the development of several graduate attributes and these are integrated into its teaching-learning processes and evaluation protocols. These include.

- Developing language skills through written assignments and class presentations and Group Discussions.
- Developing analytical and technical skills through independent projects, internships, field-trips, utilization of advanced equipment and a wide-range of software.
- Abilities such as providing leadership and initiative, working co-operatively within a team, assuming responsibilities, and resolving conflict situations are identified and developed by a wide array of co-curricular and extra-curricular societies/ committees/ clubs/ organizations.
- The students are encouraged to develop a driving desire for knowledge, a vibrant dynamism and spirit of enterprise, a focused ambition, sustained commitment, ethical professionalism, innovative thinking, and an acute consciousness about the world around them

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

The Institution has established a strong Grievance Redressal Mechanism with reference to Evaluation. College Level:

- The first level of Student Grievance Redressal with reference to evaluation is at the Class teacher/HOD level.
- Unresolved Grievances are addressed by the Students' Grievance Redressal Cell.
- The third and final level of Grievance Redressal is addressed by the Principal of the College in association with **Students' Grievance Redressal Cell** and with the help of external expertise, if necessary.
- Any evaluation-related grievance can also be forwarded, after internal scrutiny, to the University for the required intervention.

2.6. Student performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes' give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

The College has clearly stated learning outcomes that are an integral part of its teaching-learning processes and evaluation protocols. The Institution firmly believes that education is not restricted to providing answers, and that it should equip students to identify the means to realize the answers for and within themselves.

The students are encouraged to develop a driving desire for knowledge, a vibrant dynamism, a focused ambition, sustained commitment, and an acute consciousness about the world around them, as the College considers every student an aspiring professional, a creative thinker and a socially aware citizen.

The College encourages its different departments to specify additional learning outcomes as teaching-learning and evaluation structures vary across disciplines. A few examples are cited:

- **Botany:** to inculcate a spirit of adventure, learning beyond what is commonly in the textbooks and creating awareness for spreading knowledge,
- English: to give the students a thorough grounding in the skills of reading, comprehension, writing and editing, and to explore their literary and extra-literary talents,
- **History:** to give the students a sense of the past and to acquaint them with the social, cultural and institutional developments that has produced the world of today and India, in particular,
- **Commerce:** to provide quality teaching with a research and industry-oriented approach for students, and to develop practical knowledge in Accounting and Auditing.

The College has a well-established and effective mechanism to ensure awareness among the principal stake-holders of its vision for the overall development of the potential, aspirations and talents of its students. Awareness among the faculty is extended by interaction of the faculty members in Departmental and Staff Council meetings.

Students, as prospective applicants, initially learn about the aims and objectives of the institution from the College website and Bulletin of Information. In addition, Orientation Programs are conducted by both the college and the respective departments on the first day of the academic year.

Awareness is spread further by interaction between the faculty and students, and between senior and newly-admitted students across the entire academic session, through discussions in Student-Faculty Committees, Departmental Societies, sports and cultural societies, seminars, open dialogues, talks and other meetings, including those with the alumni and parents.

2.6.2 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course / programme? Provide an analysis of the students results / achievements (Programme / course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes / courses offered.

The performance of the students is monitored in science labs through viva-voce and class tests and internal exams. At P.G. level the internal tests are essential part of their course evaluation.

The progress of the student is communicated by showing the internal evaluation answer books to the students so that they may understand and improve weaknesses and lackune. Necessary remedial actions out of the class room guidance and personal counseling is taken to improve the performance of weak students.

- Teachers evaluate student performance through class tests, assignments and projects, and suggest methods of improvement to individual students. In addition, teachers of each course monitor regularity of students in attending classes.
- Regular tutorial discussions enable assessment of each student's distinct requirements and abilities.
- Student performance in Internal Assessment is also analysed by each department, along with the nature of the intervention that is required. This is communicated to the students and there parents.
- Each department also evaluates student performance in the term-end examinations.
- The College monitors the attendance of students on a regular basis. Teachers are required to maintain and submit attendance records every month to IQAC.
- The College communicates the progress of students through teachers in classrooms, tutorial meetings, departmental and college notice boards, and the College website.

2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

- Our College follows the courses as prescribed by the University.
- Students are enlightened by the teachers about the various aspects of the subjects. The learners are also made aware of the social relationships, social behaviors and social responsibility by introducing NSS and NCC programmes.
- The career counseling as well as other such programmes like coaching in entry of services and communicative English helps the students to enhance their responsibility in present job scenario of the country. Campus recruitment drive in the college also helps the students to make themselves employable in the job market.

2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

It is implicit in the College vision and tradition to see students as citizens in-themaking. The holistic development of the students, emphasizing engagement with social and economic structures outside the classroom, is served through a variety of structures.

- Career Couselling and Placement: The Career Couselling and Placement Cell of College connect students to areas of practice by organizing market interface opportunities, skill and capacity building events, and most importantly recruitment.
- Entrepreneurship: Students are encouraged to acquire business-oriented skills through events organized by Career Couselling and Placement Cell, often in association with industry players.
- Innovation: College has a policy of empowering student participation in academic/ research spaces. Students' facilities for research are also proposed to be augmented. The College has been awarded 10 innovation projects currently which are interdisciplinary in nature, involving student participation.
- Social Consciousness: Student engagement with the community, with special focus on vulnerable groups, is encouraged and enabled through societies like NSS, NCC. The work of student societies/Clubs with an ecological focus is commendable indeed. Volunteers of NSS engage in tree plantation, energy conservation, cleanliness drive, and Solid-waste disposal. The NSS unit of the College has a multi-pronged community initiative that focuses on health and sanitation, literacy and reading for the blind. NSS unit organizes blood donation camps regularly. Furthermore, it has been observed that the pedagogic method often avails of the contemporary context that the students are sensitive towards, in order to explicate any abstract theory available in any discipline.

2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

Students' Performance in Internal Exams and External Examinations (V.K.S.U, Ara) are major indicators of Student progression.

- Students' marks in Internal exams are **analyzed Semester-wise** to understand the performance and progress of every student.
- Students' participation in extra-curricular activities and socially relevant initiatives, for example: participation in NSS & NCC activities, and in Leadership engagements are also monitored through the duration of their course.
- Poor performance in both the areas, i.e., curricular and other participative activities, reflect upon the drawbacks/lacuna in the achievement of the intended learning outcomes.
- **Timely intervention and customized remedial initiatives** (For example: Mentoring, Career Couselling, Additional teaching inputs, Financial support etc) are implemented to overcome the barriers to learning and to realize their achievement to the fullest extent.

2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

As a constituent of the V K S University, the College strictly follows all the evaluation norms/procedures stipulated by the university, as well as course structures and associated assessment mechanisms, attendance rules and other academic requirements such as the Academic Calendar and other processes. Within these parameters, the vision, mission and objectives of the College have already been outlined.

While the structures and strategies in place to facilitate realization of specified learning outcomes have :

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the College develops and initiates procedures and modalities for promoting the institutional environment for teaching-learning and research. The IQAC continuously monitors all aspects of curriculum and pedagogy and, in addition, facilitates collection and analysis of information and data to identify thrust areas and those aspects of institutional functioning that require intervention.

The performance of the PG students is monitored in the following ways:

- Attendance records for the semester are displayed on the departmental notice board.
- The answer scripts are also shown to the students to help them to analyze their mistakes.

- Seminars are held at departmental level to enable students to make use of technology. Instant feedback is given by the faculty to make them aware of their shortcomings.
- Assignments and project work are evaluated by the teachers and necessary suggestions are given to the students.

2.6.7 Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/evaluation outcomes as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

Any other relevant information regarding teaching-Learning and Evaluation which the college would like to include.

- Criteria 2.3.11, 2.5.2, 2.5.4, and 2.5.5 provide the necessary information concerning the evaluation process; while Criterion 2.6.3 down to Criterion 2.6.6 provides the information connecting the evaluation process to both student performance and learning outcomes.
- The analysis of student performance through the various evaluation schemes help in identifying the students who face problem in grasping and understanding a particular subject and accordingly pedagogies are strategized to bring the underperforming student at par with peers.
- The practice of holding meetings between the teachers of various departments with IQAC members and the Principal to discuss the overall result outcomes has been instrumental in exploring various aspects of teaching and learning strategies.
- The College gauges the student's performance and learning objectives by assessing the number of students qualifying their examinations with distinctions and also by keeping a track of the number students receiving awards/ prizes/ medals/ scholarships for their academic excellence.
- Keeping track of the placement through Career Couselling and Placement Cell or through individual efforts.
- Feedback from the students about the teaching learning process is crucial to improving the same.
- Remedial classes are held for weak students.
- Students, who are low in confidence, are encouraged to participate in various activities held by different societies in the College.

3.1 Promotion of Research

3.1.1 Does the institution have recognized research center/s of the affiliating University or any other agency/organization?

Individual teachers from various departments are actively involved in research activities and they have been able to develop research facilities and centers that are well known in the University and outside. The University acknowledges this by allowing Ph.D. students to get enrolled under these teachers who use the respective facilities and expertise established in the college to carry out research activities.

H D Jain College, Ara has an impressive academic history and a supportive, encouraging atmosphere for research activities but as of now the institution does not have a recognized research center/centers of the affiliating University or any other agency.

- The College has constantly and successfully endeavoured to keep the scientific and computational laboratories updated with latest equipment and related software resources to be research ready for both regular research work and special commissioned research. Research work in conjunction with the affiliating university is an integral part of the College even though there is no dedicated autonomous research centre. The locational advantage that the College has of proximity with the main faculties of the affiliating university has resulted in an enduring network of supervisors, research candidates, equipment, and an overall environment conducive to research.
- The various departments of the College have well equipped laboratories. Though not recognized research centres as such, significant research activity takes place in these laboratories. Further, the College aspires to have recognized centres dedicated to research in sciences, social sciences, commerce and humanities. The college plan to established Linguistics Research Centre: For carrying out research in the languages of Hindi, English, Sanskrit- well equipped with software and translation facilities. Science Research Centre: To promote excellence in research and innovation; the College proposes to have a state of the art Science Research Centre.

3.1.2 Does the Institution have a research committee to monitor and address the issues of research? If so, what is its composition? Mention a few recommendations made by the committee for implementation and their impact.

Yes, the institution has a research committee to support, evaluate and co-ordinate research programmes for faculty and students. It is evident that the college is enthusiastically engaged in research activities, by the number of minor, major and innovative projects awarded to various faculty members, H D Jain College had constituted a research committee in 2015. The responsibilities and functions of

the research committee was to initiate and support the research schemes. **COMPOSITION:** Research Development Committee of the College has been composed as per the requirement of University Grant Commission under XIIth plan.

One of the guiding principles recommended and upheld by the existent Research Committee, that has been fruitfully integrated in the institution's everyday conduct is to have an interdisciplinary focus in research initiatives. In order to achieve this, the Committee works around the following:

- To motivate young faculty to take up research scheme projects.
- To disseminate information coming from various government/ private agencies regarding funding for conducting research work, and for conducting /attending workshops/ seminars.
- To allocate space for carrying out research work, so as to have optimum utilization of the available infrastructure.
- The College has recently constituted the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) with constituent members from the teaching faculty, representative(s) of parents and students, alumni, industry and the wider community. This measure has widened the membership base of the quality initiative of the College, by incorporating all stakeholders.
- The College at the administrative level is supportive of research for both faculty members and students alike. Both the Principal Investigator(s) and the Mentor(s) are autonomously responsible for their specific research initiative.
- Faculty members are encouraged about their lifelong learning initiatives; refresher and orientation courses in interdisciplinary subjects are welcomed and promoted. Faculty members are constantly urged to complete their doctoral research and subsequent research initiatives. In a similar spirit students are guided in their innovative and interdisciplinary research initiatives promoted by the affiliating University, UGC and other Research collaborative agencies.

3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/ projects?

The Research Committee of the college is constituted primarily to assess the impact of a project on its infrastructure that is submitted to the college for approval. Once the project gets the no objection from this committee, it gets the approval from the college and then the project proposal is submitted to the relevant funding agency for approval by the teacher. Once approved the grants are released by the funding agency and then as per the commitment, the college provides the necessary infrastructure to facilitate the research activity. Grant released by funding agencies is deposited in college funds and is used by the concerned faculty as and when required for the project. The utilization certificates are issued after regular audits are carried out by a Registered Chartered Accountant. The college and funding agency are acknowledged in the published research articles and papers.

The institution helps in smooth running of the research laboratories and allows for the purchase and maintenance of equipments/chemicals/consumables with the sanctioned grant by the funding agency whose accounts are maintained through statement of accounts. Such laboratories that are developed in the college to carry out the projects and other research activities get help from the fact that the entire college is Wi-Fi enabled and even the college library is well equipped.

Institution permits research scholars to work in college premises during non-working days and till late hours. Faculty members are normally expected to be present during the non-teaching timings for guiding these students. In addition to these the institution also encourages and sanctions study leave to its faculty members for completing research study/ post-doctoral studies and duty leave for attending national and international seminars and conferences as well as participating in refresher courses and workshop to update themselves on the recent and advanced developments.

- Autonomy to the Principal Investigator: Full autonomy is given to the Principal Investigator by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects.
- **Timely availability or release of resources:** The Institution makes all necessary arrangements for timely availability or release of resources for smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects.
- Adequate infrastructure and human resources: Adequate infrastructure and human resources are provided by the institution for smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects. Created laboratories for major projects. The college authority has provided space in each department to carry out minor research projects and research activities for the faculty. Provided computer and internet facilities for all departments. Purchased books and journals according to the needs of the faculty.
- **Time-off, reduced teaching load, special leave etc. to teachers:** Due to shortage of staff almost in every department, the institution cannot afford to reduce teaching load for the sake of the students. However special leave is granted when and where it is necessary.
- **Support in terms of technology and information needs:** Internet, LAN, INFLIBNET and journal and e-journal subscription is made available to the Principal Investigator by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects.
- Facilitate timely auditing and submission of Utilization Certificate to the funding authorities: The institution monitors and facilitate timely auditing and submission of Utilization Certificate to the funding authorities.
- Any other: The institution encourages and extends all help possible to promote

research activities in the institution.

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

To develop scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students following efforts are made by various departments of the college.

- Each session begins with an orientation programme with an introduction to the scientific traditions of the departments.
- There are annual programmes organized by dedicated societies/ Clubs of college, in which speakers from various sections of society are invited to share their experience and knowledge at the undergraduate level.
- The students are actively involved and encouraged in planning students' activities. For any such activity, they are divided into groups and sub groups and are asked to execute tasks assigned to them. This kind of approach not only inculcates scientific temper but helps them in developing an attitude to work in groups.
- Debates, paper reading contest and quizzes are organized on the recent issues in the Department.
- The students are encouraged to visit various laboratories around the campus and places of scientific interest to create awareness about the latest developments.
- Students are recommended to attend seminars/workshops and summer/winter training programmes in other scientific institutes.
- Students participate in innovation projects of the college, which are collaborative projects wherein interdisciplinary interaction and exchange of information are encouraged.
- Teachers expose students to new discoveries and methodologies by teachinglearning process, scientific news and videos.
- Students are encouraged to work on short term research projects to foster the research culture amongst them.
- National conference organized on the topics of global significance to provide world wide exposure to students and faculty by providing opportunity to interact with Luminaries from research centres, National institutions for interactive sessions on recent developments.
- Visits to research centre of national repute are organized for PG students and faculty members.
- PG students are motivated to get higher education and career options in research field by the subject teachers also the guidance to prepare for competitive examinations like NET, GATE and SLET is provided.

3.1.5 Give details of the faculty involvement in active research (Guiding student research, leading Research Projects, engaged in individual/collaborative research activity, etc.

A large number of faculty members participate in supervision and guidance of

research students of the affiliating university.

Involvement of faculty in active research includes doctoral thesis guidance, project work and individual/collaborative research activity. Some of the teachers' achievements worth mentioning are as follows:-

3.1.6 Give details of workshops/ training programmes/ sensitization programmes conducted/organized by the institution with focus on capacity building in terms of research and imbibing research culture among the staff and students.

Various departments of the college actively organize/conduct seminars, workshops, informative lectures, capacity building programmes and training programmes to equip the faculty, students and even people from various sections of the society with knowledge of latest technologies and inventions and to promote research culture.

3.1.7 Provide details of prioritized research areas and the expertise available with the institution.

Priority areas for research

- Priority areas of Research among the Arts Faculty members are Women's Studies, Philosophy, Ethics and Religious Studies, Ancient & Cultural History, Eco-Tourism.
- Priority areas of Research among the Science Faculty members are Space Science, Nuclear Physics, Applied Mathematics, Neuroscience, Water Treatment, Taxonomy of Animals, Taxonomy of Plants, Entomology, Cell and Molecular Biology.
- Priority areas of Research among the Social Science & Commerce Faculty members are Intellectual Property Rights, Development and Commerce, Banking and Finance, & Environmental Economics.

3.1.8 Enumerate the efforts of the institution in attracting researchers of eminence to visit the campus and interact with teachers and students?

It is a regular practice to invite Researchers of eminence as resource persons for Seminars, Workshops, Guest Lectures, etc organized by the departments in the College. These initiatives offer opportunities for the students and faculty to interact with such eminent resources persons for further research interests

- During the last three years, the College has been organizing a program called INSPIRE (Innovation in Science Pursuit for Inspired Research) sponsored by Department of Science and Technology, Government of India. It is an annual (residential) program spreading over five days.
- Our alumni who are engaged in scientific pursuit in advanced Research Institutions visit our Institution and interact with our students and faculty.
- Through local NGOs, we are able to attract eminent Research Scholars to interact

with our Faculty members and students.

3.1.9 What percentage of the faculty has utilized Sabbatical Leave for research activities? How has the provision contributed to improve the quality of research and imbibe research culture on the campus?

The Sabbatical leave for research activity has not been utilized by any faculty. In fact, it has not been demanded by any faculty.

However, the institution often sanctions leave to those who are perusing their Ph. D or working on research projects. About 4 (four) of the permanent faculty members have been sanctioned study leave for undertaking research activities leading to the award of Ph. D Degrees in last four years and for presentations in seminars with the hope that their exposure and work shall ultimately benefit the student community and staff of the College.

3.1.10 Provide details of the initiatives taken up by the institution in creating awareness/advocating/transfer of relative findings of research of the institution and elsewhere to students and community (lab to land)

The college takes up various initiatives in creating awareness among the students and community. The workshops organized in the college help students and teachers alike. The proceedings of seminars organized on different topics from time to time on the latest and burning topics like women empowerment and human rights are published by the Media. Educational come excursion trips are organized on regular basis which provides the students exposures. Recently Department of Geography organized geographical excursion trips of Rajgir, Pawapuri, Nalanda and Kakolat natural water fall. This helps and informs the community at large. The latest information received and methodology of teaching learnt by the teachers through GOC (General Orientation Courses and Refresher Courses) also help students to update their knowledge.

3.2 Resource Mobilization for Research

3.2.1 What percentage of the total budget is earmarked for research? Give details of major heads of expenditure, financial allocation and actual utilization.

The institution does not get funds for carrying out research projects. It is recognized primarily as a teaching institution where faculty also carry out research activities. It is the potential of the faculty which has taken the institution to phenomenal levels altogether in the area of research. Although the College does not have any budget dedicated for research but the projects sanctioned by the funding agency bring in the finances to look after the research interests of the teachers.

There is no provision in the institution to provide seed money to the faculty for research. However, the institution and the university may consider the genuine proposal forwarded by the faculty for the financial help. The various departments and staff of the institute interact with each other in undertaking inter-disciplinary research. Examples of successful endeavours for interdisciplinary research are:

- Organizing Seminars and Conferences. Department of History, Philosophy and Political Science have organised two national level seminars.
- The Teacher's council of the college organises a unique Interdisciplinary programme -- Study Circle for Faculty members to Present Papers various research oriented Subject Matters which is supported by the college authority. The Paper presented in the Study Circle is published annually college magazine.

3.2.5 How does the institution ensure optimal use of various equipment and research facilities of the institution by its staff and students?

The college ensures optimal use of various equipment and research facilities with the help of teaching, non-teaching staff (lab staff etc.) and students. All the TICs are required to document and maintain a record of the equipment purchased during his/her tenure, and the register is subsequently handed-over to the next Teacher In-Charge of the department who takes up the responsibility by rotation. The lab-staff of the science departments are fully trained to use and maintain the instruments and share this responsibility. The departmental facilities and instruments are available to the teachers and students for day-to-day practical classes, research projects, and are

also used during seminars/workshops.

Further, stock registers of equipment are also maintained to monitor their use. The library and the labs can be made available till late hours and on some holidays, on request or prior permission of the Principal.

H D Jain College is a premier V K S University college with well-established teaching and research credentials. Each Science Department has adequate space for their labs fitted with modern research equipments and dedicated faculty and non-teaching staff. The staffs are encouraged to attend regular training programmes This empowers the faculty and students to conduct basic as well as specialized research.

The following research facilities are available for active research work within the college campus:

- Various labs such as Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Psychology, Geography and Commerce with latest equipment.
- Central computing with printing facility.
- Internet Connections with Wi-Fi Campus.
- Automated Central College Library with OPAC facilities Departmental Library, Departments are well-equipped with LCD, printers, scanners, and Internet facilities.
- Reprographic Facility.
- Procurement of Research Oriented Journals & E-Journals.
- Laboratories for Major Research Projects with Latest equipment.
- Space/Enclosures to carry out Minor Research Projects.
- College is member of INFLIBNET and provided several teachers and students their own account and password.

3.3.2 What are the institutional strategies for planning, upgrading and creating infrastructural facilities to meet the needs of researchers especially in the new and emerging areas of research?

The Research Committee, constituted as per the UGC Plan, looks after the interest of faculty applying for research projects by providing them the best possible support. This committee is also authorized to recommend up-gradation of infrastructure facilities to the Development Committee of the college. Our College has more than 10 Labs in Science and other Departments. The College promotes research activities and works towards streamlining the working condition as far as possible.

Several institutional strategies have been developed from time to time for the benefit of students and the institution. Development committee looks after the infrastructure of the college with the help of Building Committee and Purchase Committee. During the last 3-4 years college has purchased various instruments from share of the college in the project grants by following the UGC norms in this regard.

The College Research Committee chalk out institutional strategies for planning, upgrading and creating infrastructural facilities to meet the needs of researchers. It has stipulated the following strategies:

- Keeping track of the various research projects funded by UGC, ICCR, DST etc.
- Updating the teachers regarding the various fellowships and facilitate in applying for the same.
- Monitor that infrastructural facilities are provided in the College premises to carry out Major and Minor Research Projects.
- Recommended for Leave to present research papers in seminars, conferences and workshops by the faculty members.
- Based on the suggestions of the committee the college authority has provided Computer with Internet and Reprographic facilities for all faculty Procured Research Oriented Journals & E-Journals.
- The Teacher's council of the college organises a unique Interdisciplinary programme -- Study Circle for Faculty members to Present Papers various research oriented Subject Matters which is supported by the college authority.

3.3.3 Has the institution received any special grants or finances from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facilities? If 'yes', what are the instruments / facilities created during the last four years.

In the recent past, the Human Resource Department Govt. of Bihar (Higher Education) has supplied some latest research equipment to its colleges. This was done in its attempt to upgrade the labs with a vision of promoting research activities among the teaching community.

3.3.4 What are the research facilities made available to the students and research scholars outside the campus / other research laboratories?

Research scholars who are registered with teachers of our college for Ph.D. and other degree are provided all sort of facilities to do their work in college laboratories. If they need some extra requirements relating to their research work, concerned research institutes, institutions are requested to extend support to our teachers.

The college library has more than 75,000 Books and 19 journals and various magazines along with 10 daily newspapers available to Students and teachers. Library facilitates quick purchase of any books and journals required for students.

E-books and e-journals are also available on the personalized network through INFLIBNET (Ahmadabad centre) subscribed by the library.

There is a dedicated Portal room available to access internet facilities open to students, teachers and the research scholars. This room offer printing and photocopying facilities to its users within the library premises.

The following facilities are available specifically for the researchers:

- Internet facility.
- Reprographic Facility.
- Central computing facility.
- Online Journals.
- Procurement of Research Oriented Journals.
- Various labs such as Physics, Chemistry, Botany & Zoology with Latest equipment.
- General/Departmental Library, Departments are well-equipped with LCD, printers, scanners, and Internet facilities and Wi-Fi campus.

3.3.6 What are the collaborative research facilities developed/ created by the research institutes in the college. For ex. Laboratories, library, instruments, computers, new technology etc.

- Almost each laboratory has a projector system with Wi-Fi connectivity that helps in showing PowerPoint presentation and other useful videos, photograph and documents to the students.
- Though our laboratories still require more funding for development to keep up pace with the ever-improving and updating technologies, however they are sufficient for carrying out basic research.
- Our Computer labs are equipped with 25 Mbps-speed internet facilities. Modern useful software are available offline with different departments.

3.5 Consultancy

3.5.1 Give details of the systems and strategies for establishing institute-industry interface?

From the perspective of the institution, the institute-industry interface has a strong bearing on the College's intellectual capital. At our College, this aspect of grooming students occurs through the following ways:

- The Career Counseling and Placement Cell of College each year has been inviting several reputed companies and industries to share an interactive platform with the students.
- Interaction with these companies includes organizing seminars, skill enhancement workshops, talks and industry/company visits to improve the job readiness of students.
- The Placement Cell also organizes various seminars related to resume writing skills, communication skills throughout the academic year especially for the final year and pre-final year students to help them prepare themselves better and to be in sync with the recruiters' demand.
- In addition, the College had initiated Add-on Courses on Computers for Electronics, Theatre, Media, which due to space crunch were suspended for a while. These will be initiated again soon.
- The alumni of the College work as a network and support initiatives of institute-industry interface.
- Visits to industry as part of course work are also undertaken.

3.5.2 What is the stated policy of the institution to promote consultancy? How is the available expertise advocated and publicized?

We do not have a specific or a stated policy to promote consultancy. The detailed profile of all the faculty members have been uploaded on the college website. Consultancies given to outer agencies are most of the time 'honorary' or on simple token honorarium/ Travel Allowance basis. Our teachers are well known in their field of expertise and are invited as consultants in different institutes/ agencies for

delivering talks and lectures. They are also members of many expert committees in curriculum development.

3.5.3 How does the institution encourage the staff to utilize their expertise and available facilities for consultancy services?

The available facilities for consultancy services are as per the V K S U rules. The consultancy is not meant for generation of revenue/funds, there is no monetary benefit accorded either to any individual teacher, or to the institute. Nonetheless, the college promotes teaching, research and consultancy with their parent university as well as other Universities. Many faculty members are involved in teaching PG at V K S U, writing articles for magazines, journals and for news papers, preparing course material, guiding Ph.D. and M. Phil students, along with their primary duties of UG and PG teaching. H D Jain College, Ara has an illustrious list of faculty members whose proficiency in their respective fields have brought honors not only to them, but also to the college. Our faculty members are invited to various institutions of repute to deliver talks, and are also in their advisory boards/councils for scholarly guidance and support. They have prepared many applied courses, academic projects and research ventures in varied fields. Few of them have also been on deputation to advise and oversee innovative proposals and educational policies.

3.5.4 List the broad areas and major consultancy services provided by the institution and the revenue generated during the last four years.

- Teachers of the College are primarily engaged in teaching and research. Their consultation focus has been broadly within the academic ambit and not necessarily directly in line with requirements of business houses or industry sectors. The College does not have a revenue model with respect to consultancy services.
- H D Jain College has been actively engaged in extending assistance for community building beyond the four walls of the institution. The faculty members have been associating in areas of social empowerment by way of providing technical inputs, consultancies, talks, lectures, participation in various Programmes organized through concerned ministries and hosted by NGOs, and other State and National bodies etc.
- Faculty members have been sharing their intellectual, technical expertise both formally and informally with industry and other stakeholders. Over the years, some of these members have gained noteworthy appreciation for their contributions to society. Many faculty members are spearheads in charting new curricula or providing technical advice for implementation of new methodologies in the curriculum.
- The College has housed many such faculty members who have been authorities in their areas, and have contributed to the reputation that the College enjoys.
- As such however, the College works in line with the University policies in this regard where no revenue generation is allowed.

3.5.5 What is the policy of the institution in sharing the income generated through consultancy (staff involved: Institution) and its use for institutional development?

Since H D Jain College is V K S U managed college, and V K S U policies strictly prohibit any form of revenue generation through consultancy. Hence, there is never a direct income that can be accrued in the process. However, the college has sufficient extra-mural funds granted from various funding agencies that have been a great support to the college.

3.6 Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR)

3.6.1 How does the institution promote institution-neighbourhood- community network and student engagement, contributing to good citizenship, service orientation and holistic development of students?

The College is committed to the institution's presence in the immediate neighbourhood and the larger realm of social concerns. This is ensured by integrating community exposure into the routine practices of teaching and pedagogy. There are some students' organisations and societies entirely dedicated to such initiatives.

- National Service Scheme (NSS): NSS the long standing, country wide network of social service and outreach has contributed immensely through volunteering in community education Programmemes, creating awareness drives, teaching underprivileged children through one to one kind of mentorship. The NSS unit of H D Jain College, Ara works under the following wings: Education, Health, Environment, Disaster Management, Personality Development.
- National Cadet Corps (NCC) H D Jain College runs the Army Wing of NCC. It aims to develop character, discipline, and the ideals of selfless service amongst the youth of country, to contribute to creation of organized, trained and motivated youth, to provide leadership in all walks of life and be always available for the service of the nation.
- Women's Empowerment Cell (WEC): The Women's Empowerment Cell (WEC) of H D Jain College, Ara has been functioning since 2015. It attempts to sensitize the student and teaching community on issues relating to gender discrimination, women's rights and empowerment. In the past, it has successfully organized Programmes on female foeticide, sexual harassment, besides organizing self-defense workshop in association with Bihar Police. The Cell endeavours to involve both male and female students in its information dissemination and sensitization activities, so as to foster a healthy dialogue based on mutual trust, respect and co-operation.
- **Eco-Club:** The Environment Society: Established in 2015, brings awareness among students as well as the College staff about the environment and its protection Amongst its committed activities are the paper collection drive during the student elections (pamphlets, posters etc.) and donating the collected paper to

an NGO for blind students, tree plantation drives in and outside the campus, .and anti-smoking campaign.

- **Cultural Society:** Another illustration of institution neighbourhood and community network in the College can be found in the activities of the Cultural Society, on an average has more than a dozen stagings of street theatre every year on various social concerns ranging from gender discrimination to corruption. The group also participates in motivating target groups with regard to specific social initiatives.
- Over the years the College has worked in coordination with the affiliating university and the state and the central government.
- The cleanliness drive launched by the central government has also been enthusiastically supported through participation of students and faculty members by keeping the campus and its environs clean through regular drives.

3.6.2 What is the Institutional mechanism to track students' involvement in various social movements / activities which promote citizenship roles?

- All societies/ Clubs in the College are convened by faculty members. This ensures an interactive environment for both students and the faculty members to think democratically towards presentation and participation in any Programme that is eventually conducted.
- The finances of the societies/ Clubs are run through the College's office to ensure transparency.
- The College also publishes its magazine "**ABHIYAN**" annually where students and faculty members contribute and the editorial board has a healthy mix of both students' representatives and that of faculty members.

3.6.3 How does the institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution?

- The faculty members seek and integrate opinions of students in their teaching plan as a routine feature of imparting training in a mutually helpful way.
- There is also a provision for the institution to learn about students' opinions and grievances through feedback forms.
- The administration including Principal's Office has an open-door policy of regarding any feedback, grievance or suggestion.
- 3.6.4 How does the institution plan and organize its extension and outreach programmes? Providing the budgetary details for last four years, list the major extension and outreach programmes and their impact on the overall development of students.

The voluntary organization NSS & NCC have made a annual plan for the social activities under the guidance of the Principal in the outset of the academic session. The Volunteers of NSS & NCC take out rallies and spread awareness about AIDS and other Social problems.

The NSS & NCC organized special camps in different rural areas during last two years to undertake different activities pertaining to:

- Creating an awareness programme for improvement of status of women,
- Health and family welfare Programme,
- Blood Donation Camp,
- Education and recreation,
- Sensitizing the villagers about Welfare Scheme of the Government

3.6.5 How does the institution promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC, YRC and other National/International agencies?

At the time of admission of the students, the Admission Committee, comprising teachers in charge of various committees, asks students about their interest in extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC and encourages them accordingly.

The College monitors that a student enrolls in the extension activities right after the admission. The NSS & NCC Units undertakes drive to enroll for membership in their units after admission in the 1st year. There are two Units of NSS & NCC consisting of 100 students in each unit.

- The Prospectus disseminates information regarding all the extension activities to facilitate them in their choice of activity.
- This is supplemented by the counseling provided by the teachers during the time of admission and also after.
- The faculty has meetings with Principal in which it is asked to mention its interest in extension activities including participation in NSS and other agencies and is assigned duties accordingly.
- The institution promotes these extension activities by extending help in the form of manpower, funds, refreshment and transport. The achievements of the teachers and students are acclaimed and highlighted in the college publications and college website, thus promoting their participation.
- Keeping in view the social needs and responsibilities students from all Department are enrolled for N.S.S (National Services Scheme) for performing various social activities in terms of blood donation Camps, extension lectures, skill development programmes etc.

- The Central/ State government provisions are followed and awareness drives are taken up from time to time, for example with respect to anti-ragging, sexual harassment and liquor ban.
- The College faculty have personalised contact discussions with students over questions of stress and coping, showing institutional alertness and empathy.
- The College creates a common data pool of applicants who seek scholarship and fee concession and through administrative review, grants are provided every year. There are a number of scholarships, Students Aid Fund (SAF), PwD fee concessions and further consideration of fee waiving on case by case basis.
- The College has a provision of remedial classes for students with special requirements and for learners who may have difficulty with comprehending the English language and certain accents.
- Equal Opportunity Cell, the society dedicated to the differently abled has its presence beyond the physical walls of the College's campus. The NSS volunteers are always ready to serve the people who are in distress.

Objectives: The college encourages extension activities to promote social-justice, social responsibilities and good citizenship amongst its students.

Outcomes of the extension activities:

- The local community benefitted immensely through the work put in by our students. Frequent programmes with the remote village dwellers of the local area by our College have indeed raised the quality of life of these people.
- In the nutrition awareness camps mothers of the backward villages attend each camp along with their children and adolescent daughters to learn proper cooking procedure through demonstration and change life-style through low-cost nutrition and hygiene awareness.
- Organizing free Medical Check-up Camps, providing free medicines and vocational training workshops have brought about a noticeable difference in the lives of the community.
- The Blood Donation Camps organized by the NSS Units& NCC, the Students' Union and Staff form another significant contribution to the community

Students' academic learning experience

• The surveys conducted by the departments and involvement in extension activities also develop a practical approach in their academic pursuits.

- Participating in the Environmental awareness programmes increase the environmental awareness of the students.
- Surveys-cum nutrition awareness programmes with the village dwellers who are below the poverty line in different areas of the Bhojpur district make the students aware of the importance of nutrition and also help them to understand the problems the remote village dwellers faces and establish a connection with the common people of the society.
- This leads to a holistic personality development of a student which helps in their future endeavour in any career which they opt for.

Values and skills inculcated:

- Involvement in extension activities develop community orientation, community leadership, and may produce philanthropists and social workers in future. This also leads to Creation of awareness and scientific rationale about blind beliefs, blind faiths dogmas, negative traditions, hygiene/health and sustainable development.
- Extension and outreach programmes instill volunteerism and philanthropy in the students.
- A deeper understanding of and commitment to the community is developed in students.
- The experience gained through extension and outreach programmes helps students make better decisions, adapt to change, improve their self-esteem and better prepare for their career, among other benefits.
- The such programmes encourage students to develop a lifelong ethic of service to society.

The college makes plan for social activities with the consultations of Non-Governmental organizations as well as social activists. The volunteers of NSS & NCC our college make a regular rapport with the social activists and the rural people encourage the community service programme. The villagers support us in organizing the special camps and get benefitted with it.

- Free Medical Camp was also organized. In this the NSS unit of H D Jain College provided free treatment and free medicines to poor slum dwellers. In fact, the monthly event of the Free Medical Camp was a huge success.
- The College collected essential amenities for flood victims, earth quack victims.

4.1 **Physical Facilities**

The college has a well-designed institutional set up for policies related to creation and enhancement of relevant infrastructure. The Development Committee of the college is the supreme body for framing and executing these policies. It formulates infrastructure policies and ensures its implementation. It also carries out implementation of infrastructure polices taken by the University, UGC and the State Government. The College Development Committee constitutes "Building Committee" This committee takes major decisions on infrastructure policies including financial matters.

This committee is assisted by recommendatory bodies like the Staff Council of the college and committees formed by the council like, Development Committee, (the staff council committee to assist differently-abled students) Sports Council, Portal committee, Canteen committee, library adversary committee etc. These committees have mandate to take policy decisions on matters designated to these committees. These committees form their own respective purchase committees to implement their vision. The College has a Central Purchase Committee for works that are not covered by these committees. The Building Committee also plays a major role in decision making in case of overlap in infrastructure policy decisions of different committees.

To facilitate effective use of these infrastructures various committees are formed which work towards this objective in a decentralised manner. For example, the library committee consists of teacher representative of each department. It ensures that the library could purchase books and subscribe journals on the basis of recommendation of individual faculty.

Implementation of the policies that are decided by the university and institutions like UGC is ensured by the Governing body of the College. This is facilitated by college administration through committees formed by Staff council and the Principal. However to realize this at the college level, the staff council committees like Central computer committee, Portal committee and different departmental committees were assigned to help in implementation of this vision. The central computer committee developed a computer facility lab. The same committee facilitated the installation of Wi-Fi in the college for students and staffs.

4.1.3 How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized? The development of infrastructure has been taking place over the years to meet the requirements of changing curricular and co-curricular activities and for modernisation. The Development Committee of the College is responsible for creation of mechanism to plan and to ensure optimal utilisation of different infrastructure pertaining to academic matters. Various committees are constituted by the staff council for the purpose. For example, the Time Table committee ensures optimal utilisation of class rooms. It also looks at proper allocation of classrooms with projectors. The committee has been reviewing the requirements of projectors for classrooms. Subsequently, numbers of classrooms with such facilities have been increased. The central ICT Implementation and Maintenance manages one computer labs. This Lab. is allocated as practical labs under mandatory course requirements by the ICT Implementation and Maintenance committee in consultation with the time table committee. The college also has Portal room for general access of computers and internet. The College provide Wi-Fi facilities. To ensure its optimal utilization, access to Wi-Fi is denied to the passed out students. The faculty members are provided with laptops. Differently-abled students are given primacy in providing barrier free access to learning resources. The college has a dedicated space for use by differently-abled students. We have a mechanism for booking of seminar rooms for various important activities like lectures, seminar, paper presentation, screening of movies, workshops, etc.

• There are 10 Laboratories for Subjects: Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Geography, Psychology, Commerce and Computer. The laboratories extended and are upgraded with advanced Laboratory equipments and have given enough space to carry out practical classes effectively.

- A well-designed modern central Network Resource Centre is built with advanced LAN, Wi-Fi, Internet and multi-media facilities.
- The College has a conference room with advanced audio-visuals multi-media facilities like LCD Projector, Laptop, and Computer with High Configuration of the Latest Generation with Internet connections to organise seminars, lectures and other academic activities and administrative meetings.
- Common Rooms for boys and girls and all toilets and purified drinking water facilities for students and staff has been renovated.
- The student canteen has been renovated.
- Principal' room. Bursar's Office and college Office has been renovated.
- Office rooms for UGC Sponsored Remedial Coaching Classes and Coaching Classes for Entry in Service Examination for SC/ST/OBC/Minority students renovated.

4.1.4 How does the institution ensure that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of students with physical disabilities?

The College ensures the implementation of guidelines formulated by competent authority and experts working with physically disabled. In pursuance of these guidelines the College has developed infrastructural facilities like ramps, differently abled washrooms, ensuring that their classes are generally held on the ground floor of the College. A dedicated resource center with computers and related software has also been developed which is also on the ground floor of the College. The visually challenged students are also provided recording devices to record their lectures. The College has constituted a society, PRAYAAS, for Differently abled students of the College and it is run by students selected from the pool of differently-abled students under the guidance of teacher representative. This society looks into the proper implementation of guidelines, efficient use of the infrastructural facilities available and it also makes suggestion for further improvements on the basis of the feedback received from the differently abled students.

Health Centre: A Health Care Center is available in campus with one doctor and one Paramedical staff for monitoring the health of the students, teachers and non-teaching staff during medical emergencies during day hours. There is a separate room for the Health Care Center with all first aid equipments, a separate emergency be and other equipments to carry out emergency and first aid providing activities for the students and staff. Monitoring the health of the students, teachers and non-teaching staff are done regularly. The unit provides First Aid Treatment for students and staff.

The Library Advisory Committee considers the development proposals of the library and budget allocations and policy decisions. Allocation and utilization of funds and introduction of developmental programs and requirements of the users are addressed and approved by the Library Advisory Committee. The Library Advisory Committee makes sincere efforts to mobilize resources from the donors and philanthropists.

- Complete Accession Numbering System & Cataloguing of all books and journals and user friendly Multi-Digit Alpha Numeric Decimal based numbering system according to the latest 22nd edition of Dewey System.
- Local Area Network (LAN) using Lib-MAN (Library Management System Software) has been procured for automating in-house activities and services of the library.
- There are total Twenty (20) computers.
- One is a Server for internal LAN for standard software and Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) and Two for Issues/Return of Books and Journals
- Installed 20 computers for Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) is made available to the users to identify the status of availability of documents in the library.

- One photocopier and printing facilities.
- It also has Reference facility.
- Software required for access have been procured and installed in the main server and clients to make the library accessible by all users.
- Information on Competitive Examinations is the unique facilities for career planning and development programs.
- Online search and full text e-journals provided are being made available.
- The Internet access is opened between 10: 30 am to 5.15 pm on all working days

- The reading room (reserved Section) is on the first floor and it has a seating arrangement for about 50 students.
- The stack area in the library is on all the two floors ground, and first on first floor Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) facility is available for the students to search the desired book and library staff are present to assist.
- The College library, like the whole campus, is on the Wi-Fi network and students can use the Internet and can access the e-resources (provided by the INFLIBNET). M-OPAC and Web OPAC facilities is available to search and to reserve book issue on smart phones and laptops. There is a separate space and computer facility in the library for accessing the internet and e-resources.

4.3.3 What are the institutional plans and strategies for deploying and upgrading the IT infrastructure and associated facilities?

Modern college campuses need to be equipped with the more active, learnercentered environments needed to prepare students for the future workplaces they will enter. This means learning environments should offer a range of facilities suited for the new pedagogical methodologies which are being introduced. To succeed in this changing environment, higher educational institutions must change as well. The majority of colleges and universities cannot rely on historical brand equity alone but will have to create more effective teaching-learning processes and employ more robust models to stand out and survive in today's competitive environment. In keeping with modern requirements, the College uses Information and Communication Technologies widely in both its administrative and pedagogic sections.

- Extensive use of e-mail and mobile messaging is done to establish communication links between the administration and the Teaching Staff. This has the added environmental benefit of reducing paper use. It also helps in dissipating the time lag inherent in the older system of issuing notices in hard copies.
- The College recently commissioned MIS Office which can provide several Information regarding students administration, payroll, finance and stock etc.
- As mentioned above, the library is fully automated, with an electronic database of all the books. OPAC facility is available for the users. The Library is subscribing to NLIST and it can be accessed from anywhere.
- As one of its strategic goals, the College proposes to increase its ICT infrastructure in the following ways:
- Improve Wi-Fi connectivity across the College campus
- Introduce white/smart boards.
- Transform more classrooms into e-classrooms by adding LCD projectors and smart boards.
- Online admission facilities has been initiated.

- Many departments are starting the practice of using blogs and social websites to enhance student-teacher, student-student, teacher-teacher interaction and information disseminations.
- Many faculties assign assignments to the students and ask them to complete it using OER from internet, and also encourage the students to make power point presentation or submit assignments online.
- Computer literacy workshops are conducted from time to time in the College for students and faculty to make them e-savvy.
- Students are apprised of web learning resources to broaden the scope of their understanding.

The use of ICT in education and training has become a priority during the last decade. Use of ICT makes the rendering of education globally comparable and readies the student to face global challenges. These new technologies encourage independent and active learning, and students' responsibility for their own learning. Students who use ICT-enabled educational methodologies feel more successful and are motivated to learn more and have increased self-confidence and self-esteem. Most students find learning in a technology-enhanced setting more stimulating and much better than in a traditional classroom environment.

The ICT enabled class-rooms of H D Jain College, Ara have made teaching and learning a two-way process, facilitating greater interactive sessions. Teaching and learning have become more qualitative and effective through the use of extensive resources and infrastructure provided by the College.

The technologies used in modernizing the teaching-learning method have resulted in the following trends in the College:

- Students and teachers alike are able to access the soft resources available online, fulfilling the requirements of their curriculum as well as getting solutions to their problems at a click.
- A majority of teachers in the College use real-time step-by-step demo of solutions, multimedia presentations, and specially designed computer-aided course material.
- ICT also help teachers to work in teams and share ideas related to the time-table and curriculum.
- It has been seen that broadband and instant messaging channels such as WhatsApp and email play a central role in fostering teachers' communication and increasing collaboration between them.
- The College is in the process of acquiring an app to streamline the keeping of attendance records.
- A quizzing app is also under consideration for bringing an innovative touch to classroom teaching.
- Students learn new skills: analytical, including improvements in reading comprehension, as well as develop writing skills: spelling, grammar, punctuation, editing and re-drafting.
- Computer assisted teaching exposes students to subject-centric practical applications like those related to business and commerce, bio-informatics, DNA and protein sequences and analysis, algebra and matrices, chemical structures, computational physics, gene sequences, applied statistics and vital statistics among many others.
- Students get exposure to subject related real-life problems and learn to derive solutions to these problems in real-time.
- Students learn to use 3D modeling and computer simulation to test or verify models/theories.
- The access to internet and e-study materials has placed an infinite mine of information before the students in the College. Students utilize these vast resources to prepare their study material.
- Any student missing classes due to ill health or participation in extracurricular activities, no longer suffers for this absence. Soft copies of the class notes and presentations can help him in grasping the topic which he might have missed.

- The project works and field study reports have attained a much easier and improvised status utilizing the computer-aids.
- Access to subscribed journals which had been out of reach of most colleges due to high cost has widened the scope for an e-library where students can read a number of Journals and books on the PC and prepare study materials instead of issuing hard copies from the library

The college has several committees constituted annually to look after construction work, improvement and maintenance of physical facilities in the campus. Some of these committees are:

- **a.** Purchase committee
- **b.** Building committee
- **c.** College Development committee
- d. Finance committee

These committees work with co-ordinated efforts to identify the needs, prepare budgets, place order, procure the equipment, installation, use of the equipment and quality control.

Moreover, the services of engineers/ experts are hired whenever necessary.

4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

- There is a College Development Committee, which is a Staff Council Committee and lays down guidelines for all purchases (except of books), formulates policy regarding general maintenance of the College building, including white-washing, painting and repairs and makes recommendations regarding the future plans of development of the College. Equipment and other requirements of the Science Departments are obtained and maintained by the Departmental committees.
- The College caretaker is responsible for the proper functioning of all the systems in the College. The plumber, electrician, carpenter, guards, computer lab technician, safai karamcharies, gardening staff (malis and other staff) fulfill their respective duties. Office stationery and furniture are obtained through Purchase Committee.
- Computers, Genset, office software, pest-control etc are under annual maintenance contract and regularly serviced. The ICT related instruments and services, such as Wi-Fi, are specifically covered under annual maintenance contract.

4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/ instruments?

Annual maintenance and repair of the infrastructure is taken care by the college in a systematic manner. Day to day maintenance is carried out by the staff appointed for cleaning and maintenance of the building. The laboratory equipments are maintained through College lab. College has following technical staff:

- Electrician-cum-Caretaker (Full Time staff)
- Night Guard
- Gatekeeper (Casual)
- Computer Operator (Contractual)

Their services are available throughout the day. Some of these staff stays within the campus.

All science departments calibrate their glassware and other instruments regularly as per use and requirement.

4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)? Any other relevant information regarding Infrastructure and Learning Resources which the college would like to include.

The major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment are given below:

- The college electrician and the supporting staff is responsible for the upkeep of electrical equipments and their maintenance.
- The laboratory staff keeps a strict vigil regarding the maintenance and upkeep of the scientific instruments and Chemicals. Their repair or replacement or another required upkeep is fully undertaken in their supervision. The laboratory staffs keep a strict vigil regarding the maintenance and upkeep of the scientific instruments and Chemicals. Their repair or replacement or another required upkeep is fully undertaken in their supervision. Equipments are placed at proper & safe places.
- All major instruments and equipment are located appropriately such that they do not present any hazards to students and staff of the College. Fire-fighting units are present wherever there are chances of fire, as in all laboratories etc. The genset housing is removed from the places frequented by students and staff and is maintained by the College electrician.
- There are designated staff who have been allotted duties to operate and maintain all equipment in the College.
- Power input to major instruments in the science labs are through appropriate voltage regulators and UPSs There are two Gensets, one of 250 KVA and the other 40KVA to cover for power failures.
- Regular water supply is maintained by pumps water to overhead tanks for distribution to the drinking water systems and to the science labs and the washrooms. There are sufficient RO systems, installed in various locations in the College to meet the requirements of safe drinking water. These are under annual maintenance contracts (AMCs) and are serviced regularly. Other relevant information regarding Infrastructure and Learning Resources
- Keeping in mind the increase in student strength and the need for better facilities, the College has embarked on major infrastructure improvements that use the available space and resources generated to modernise facilities, integrate advanced technologies, improve access, campus safety and create engaged learning spaces.

The Prospectus committee which is a Staff Council committee of the College comprises a core group of dedicated faculty members who ensure that all information that appears in the prospectus is accurate and reliable. One of the most distinguished graduate and postgraduate institutions of the state Bihar H D Jain College, Ara has always striven for excellence through the commitment and cohesive efforts of its dedicated staff. The administration and faculty members extend their services to maximize benefits for students. The accountability of the College towards students and adherence to the policies outlined in the prospectus is ensured through the following mechanisms:

• Various committees like Discipline Resource Committee, ICC, Grievance and Anti-ragging committees are formed and the students are made aware of such committees that are available to address their problems.

- A students' Counselor is also on call to address any academic or personal problems that students may face.
- A number of extra-curricular societies have been instituted for all round development of the students.
- All the events academic or extra-curricular are organized under the supervision of designated faculty members to maintain efficiency and good practice.
- Orientation day is organized on the first day of the new academic session to welcome and introduce the new entrants to the ethics, protocols and various micro bodies through which the College functions.
- Students are apprised about their curriculum and academic calendar at the very beginning of the academic session. They are also informed about the deadlines for submission of assignments and projects.

H D Jain College, Ara is committed to provide the students every possible help and support they need in their pursuit to become civilized and worthy citizens. The college, as stated earlier, was set up with a mission of imparting holistic education. The institution for this purpose provides the following support facilities to its students:

Students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections:

The students belonging to SC/ST, BC-I/BC-II and the economic weaker sections are identified during the process of the admission only. The college maintains a detailed record of the same. These students are provided every possible help during their stay in the college. The college offers liberal concessions to such students. This besides the Central Govt., the State Govt., and the University sponsored scholarships and concessions are also given to such students. The college administration too is very thoughtful regarding such students. Every year the college administration sponsors a few students half free studentships and only a few students full free studentships. To make up any deficiencies, the college has started UGC Sponsored Remedial classes for the empowerment of SC/ST/BC and other backward castes. From academic year 2016-17 Bihar State Govt. allowed free education upto graduation to the students of category SC, ST, & Girls.

Students with physical disabilities:

3% seats in all undergraduate courses are reserved for candidates with physical disabilities, as per University guidelines. The College has an Equal Opportunity Cell for differently-abled students. Faculty members put in great efforts to make differently abled students capable of competing with other students. To keep these students inter-connected, a complete list of differently-abled students, with their addresses and phone numbers is maintained. Network group for all such students has also been created by the College, so that these students can communicate easily and effectively with each other. This Cell makes every possible effort to make the College friendly for persons with disability and ensures that various facilities and reading materials are provided to these students, as per their needs. The Cell organizes Workshops, short term courses and various other interactive programmes and meetings with these students, on regular basis, in the College. There is reservation in admission for students belonging to differently-abled category or physically challenged students. Their requirements and needs are given a special care and attention. The college administration ensures that infrastructure facilities meet the requirement of the students with physical disabilities. For differently-abled students, it is ensured that they don't have any physical obstruction. The institution is committed to accommodate them on the ground-floor for their classes. They are provided frontseating arrangement, comfortable furniture and attendant facility if required. They are provided classes with ramp facility. The library facility is provided to them in the ground floor located multi-purpose hall. The need of the help from the supporting staff, if required, is fulfilled on the request of physically challenged students. The students are given extra attention during the college terminal examinations as well as the final examinations.

Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance etc.:

Our College has a very special concern for the health and hygiene of the college students, staff and other members. We have Health Care Centre at the college and time to time the college administration keeps on organizing check up camps where local doctors, dentist, eye surgeon and skin specialist visit and keep a strict watch on the health of the stakeholders, the students and the staff. Proper arrangement of drinking water is present on the college campus at different locations (R.O. purified drinking water).

Skill development (Spoken English, computer literacy, etc.)The college regularly conducts Personality Development Programs which enhance the IQ level and communication skills of the participants. The college also invites Guest speakers from the industry which provides regional and global employment opportunities for the students. Special classes are taken for communication skills taking into considerations the rural backgrounds of the students. This besides the college offers "Introduction to Computer Science" as one of the subjects to all the students taking admission in the first year. This has really helped the students learn the basics of the computer language.

Support for "slow learners" The college administration understands that the college has to serve the basic education needs of one and all. The students who are slow in their learning or if their grasping power is not up to the mark, the faculty members identify such students at the beginning of the session. For them the college administration arranges remedial classes in different subjects to enhance their skills and competence. Enrichment courses like Personality Development Programs are also conducted to improve students personality and motivate them for an innovative and creative mindset. Wherever a disadvantageous learner is identified by the class teacher, the college administration appoints a guardian teacher to help him/her with counseling and intensive coaching.

Publication of student magazines The college publishes its annual college magazine (ABHIYAN). The students of the college very enthusiastically contribute with their articles in the magazine. The college magazine is printed in the supervision of the college editorial board. All the major sections of the magazine are having their staff editors. The staff is always there to chisel the students artistic and creative skills.

5.1.5 Describe the efforts made by the institution to facilitate entrepreneurial skills, among the students and the impact of the efforts.

H.D. Jain College, Ara Career Counseling & Placement Cell has helped scores of its students in finding better job opportunities and better enterprises to work in. Our Placement Cell encourages outgoing students to visualize the starting of their own enterprises and become active contributors to the nation's GDP. The placement cell assesses the needs of entrepreneurs and prepares a comprehensive training module to equip the outgoing students with necessary skills.

- The College recognizes the importance of providing proper exposure to students to develop their entrepreneurial skills. For this purpose, the College provides commerce lab. dedicated to instill the power of entrepreneurial action in commerce students with the ultimate aim of contributing in the improvement of the standards of living and quality of life for the people at large.
- Seminars, group discussions and presentations are organized on a regular basis.

 - The strong academic foundation of H D Jain College is reinforced by the view that valuable skills, attributes and talents are nurtured through student participation in various activities in addition to those of the curriculum. To promote effective participation and engagement of students in extra-curricular and co-curricular activities the following policies and strategies have been adopted.
 - The College over a period of time has instituted a bounty of rich and vibrant cultural societies each of which work under the guidance of a member of the teaching faculty.
 - The College also has a devoted NSS wing, NCC wing, Women's Empowerment Cell and Equal Opportunity Cell to promote successful engagement of students in community life and support students' growth and development into wellrounded citizens of the future.

- For sports and extra-curricular activities committees comprising of faculty members are constituted by the Staff Council.
- Cultural societies/Clubs are encouraged to participate in various competitions held in the University and colleges across State and wherever feasible funding is provided.
- The Annual College Foundation Day serves as a platform for students to not only participate in various extra-curricular events.
- Sports and Games: To promote Sports activities, every year students are admitted to various undergraduate courses under sports quota through sports like cricket, Football, basketball, volleyball, Wrestling, table tennis, chess etc. The College has a Sports Committee which is a duly constituted Staff Council Committee and a PTI. They are responsible for:
- Organizing practice sessions for the students.
- Arranging for coaches/trainers, as and when required by the students.
- Providing refreshments and sports kit to the students.
- Organizing sports activities for the students/staff such as sports day and competitive events
- Ensuring the participation of students in various inter-college competitions.
- Additional academic support, flexibility in examinations
- In all undergraduate courses, up to 4% of seats are reserved for students seeking admission under sports quota.
- Students who participate/represent the College in various extra-curricular activities and sports tournaments are given relaxation in attendance and internal assessment submission deadlines, as per University rules.
- These students can also avail the benefit of extra classes/tutorials especially arranged by the faculty to compensate for the classed missed.
- Flexibility in submission of assignments/ internal assessment projects etc. is given to such students; however, the schedule for University examinations prepared well in advance cannot be changed for them.
- Special dietary requirements, sports uniform and materials
- NCC unit provides Rs.40/- per student on the day of the parade
- All the members of the sports team, practicing in a given season, are provided food coupons worth Rs. 50/- per day (the days when they are practicing).
- NSS unit provides Rs. 20/- per student on the day of NSS activities
- Students representing the College in sports tournaments at various levels are provided with proper sports kit/ equipment/ facilities.
- The Sports Complex of the College also hosts a well-equipped gymnasium that is open to sports students, other students and faculty as well.
- Training and practice sessions are organized for sports students every morning before class.
- The College provides financial support to the teams participating in various competitions.
- On behalf of the students, the College pays entry fees as well as the transport fees

for the various teams participating in Inter College and other competitions.

5.1.7 Enumerating on the support and guidance provided to the students in preparing for the competitive exams, give details on the number of students appeared and qualified in various competitive exams such as UGC-CSIR- NET, UGC-NET, SLET,ATE / CAT / GRE / TOFEL / GMAT / Central /State services, Defense, Civil Services, etc.

There exist a good number of titles pertaining to various competitive examinations in the college. The teachers of the PG departments provide useful tips for preparing various competitive examinations particularly the UGC-NET and SLET. The PG students are informed about the deadlines and other information concerning the UGC-NET. The Career Counseling and Placement Cell of the college also provides useful information about the syllabi and paper structure of different competitive examinations. The Cell displays the relevant advertisements on its display board time to time. The institution also extends internet and INFLIBNET facility to the UG/PG students preparing for competitive examinations. Keeping in mind the socioeconomic spectrum of the students, the final year students are given academic advice to pursue suitable higher studies and other career options.

5.1.8 What type of counselling services are made available to the students (academic, personal, career, psycho-social etc.)

- The College has a dedicated Career Counseling & Placement Cell which organizes counseling sessions and interactive workshops that provide the students a platform to share their problems. It instills human values; positive thinking; physical, mental and emotional health; stress management; self-awareness; personality development; inter-personal relations; soft skills; personal and social responsibility; and many others. It also offers career guidance, counseling and workshops.
- The College has also engaged the services of a professional counselor who visits regularly for providing holistic guidance in terms of academic, personal, career, psycho-social counseling.
- The Placement Cell of the College also organizes various career counseling seminars and workshops for students throughout the year.

Academic & Career Counseling: The students, at the time of the admission, are helped by the faculty present in choosing right stream. They are informed about the scope and nature of the various subjects that from the syllabus. The students are not pressurized in choosing the subjects. They are given right kind of counseling which helps them shape their career.

Personal & Psycho-Social Counseling: The students during the course of their studies in the college come across various issues. They are, at times, too immature to handle the problems. The college provides them personal counseling. They can

share their problems with the teachers. The teacher concerned are very supportive in guiding them fight their problems. The candidates at times come face to face with certain social issues or problems which tend to bring the inferiority complex in them. The teachers make it sure that no such deterioration happens with the psycho social understanding of the students. They are counseled to become better human beings and advised to stand tall for the social cause. The somehow depressed students are given psycho treatment and counseling by the Psycho-socio cell.

5.1.9 Does the institution have a structured mechanism for career guidance and placement of its students? If 'yes', detail on the services provided to help students identify job opportunities and prepare themselves for interview and the percentage of students selected during campus interviews by different employers (list the employers and the programmes).

- The College has a dedicated Career Counseling & Placement Cell, that facilitates industry linkages and career placements for students.
- The cell annually registers undergraduate students to offer placement related information and services to registered members. However, registration with the Cell does not stand in the way for a student to be considered for on campus placements.
- It invites reputed companies and corporate houses to recruit final year students of the College on campus.
- It also organizes seminars, workshops, talks and industry/company visits to improve the job readiness of students.

Information of Job Opportunities: The students are informed regarding the vacancies offered by govt. and other agencies. The notice of the advertisement is put up on the notice board. The students are informed regarding the last date and other important information regarding the vacancies.

Preparation of Curriculum Vitae: Members of the placement centre render guidance to the students in formal and informal meetings. They are taught how to make CVs. The various technicalities are sorted out, if any.

Discussion of Exam Module & Preparation of the Exam:

The college organizes lectures on career opportunities. A thorough discussion takes place on the exam module. The students are informed regarding the syllabus, the pattern and the ways of attempting the paper. Mock tests are held to facilitate them in this pursuit. Their performance is analyzed after every test and then a brain storming session is organized to assess their strengths and weaknesses.

5.1.10 Does the institution have a student grievance redressal cell? If yes, list (if any) the grievances reported and redressed during the last four years.

• Students' Grievances are tackled by the Students Grievance Redressal Cell of the

Institution. SGR Cell plays a significant role to redress the grievances of the students undergoing studies in the college. Major issues related to their studies, library facility, safety, health, welfare, canteen facilities, proper infrastructure of laboratories, computer laboratories etc.

- Grievance cell comprising of teachers from various Depts. of the institution works under the able guidance of the principal.
- To maintain a conducive and healthy, educational environment in the college.

The Redressal Cell has the following mechanism :

- Students can register their complain in the specified Grievance Box Kept on several places of administrative block.
- The grievance is taken up by the members of the cell and after discussion the matter is resolved in no time.
- The principal and teachers are concerned about the grievances of the students and students feel free to express their grievance with them. The process of investigation in which the cell reserves the grievances are kept strictly confidential. Investigation is made in a fair way without any prejudice.

Grievances addressed during the last four years.

- A canteen was setup to meet the over increasing demand of the students.
- Water cooler and purifiers were installed in the college building.
- Computer lab has been setup with internet facility.
- Twenty four hours back up of electricity through 50 KVA generator for electric shut down.
- Inverter facility in the Lab. & Library.

5.1.11 What are the institutional provisions for resolving issues pertaining to sexual harassment?

Our college has a co-education system. A large number of girl students especially in Post-Graduate level, are enrolled in different subjects in our institution. Till date there has no any complain of sexual harassment come to light, here in this campus. Girls feel secure inside the campus. Boys and Girls respect each other.

- The College has a zero tolerance policy on sexual harassment. The College constituted the students grievance readresal cell and Women empowerment cell to address the issues of sexual harassment in the Workplace in accordance with Ordinance of the V K S University, Ara. Subsequently, as per the new notification by the University, the College has an Internal Complaints Committee in place to address complaints related to issues of sexual harassment. The committee works in accordance with Section 4(1) of Sexual Harassment of Women at the Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013 (No. 14 of 2013)^c. For any such complaint, the Presiding Officer may be contacted.
- The College has a dedicated Women's Empowerment Cell, which is committed to

nurturing the strength of female students as well as to creating a sensitized environment leading to gender equality. The Cell endeavours to involve both male and female students in its information dissemination and sensitization activities, so as to foster healthy inter-gender relationships based on mutual trust, respect and co-operation. This Cell has successfully organized a number of seminars, panel discussions and interactive sessions on various issues varying from women's empowerment to gender discrimination.

- Yes, the College has an Anti-Ragging Squard as per University Ordinance Contact details of the Squard members are displayed on the College Website as well as at prominent places in the College premises and the hostel.

- The College is very alert about any attempts at ragging. No case of ragging has come to light in the last four years.

- Arrangement of extra classes, especially for slow learners, as and when required.
- Financial assistance to the students participating in various State / National level Competions.
- Railway travel concession.
- Free access to state of the art on campus Gymnasium
- Availability of in house facility of photocopying machine.
- Banking facility for students on campus.
- Girl's common room

- The College has NCC and NSS wings for student welfare.
- The NCC unit of the College was established in 1949 with the aim of developing character, discipline, leadership, secular outlook, spirit of adventure and the ideals of selfless service amongst the students. Its activities include pulling, drill, weapon training: Rifle training, Hygiene and sanitation, First Aid, Human resource development: Values/codes of ethics, Personality development, Motivation, Decision making, Discipline, Leadership, Disaster management, the practice of Yogasanas.
- NCC organizes camps such as annual training camp, social service camps, All India summer training camps, Advanced leadership course, Nau Sainik camp, National integration camp, Republic day camp.
- Yoga Camp is organized on regular basis.
- NSS: National Service Scheme Seeks To enable students to understand the community in which they work and to understand themselves in relation with their community to identify its needs and problems and find solutions which they can be part of. To develop among students a sense of social and civic responsibility. To develop competence required for group living and sharing responsibilities as well as gaining skills in mobilizing community participation To acquire leadership qualities and democratic attitude. To develop capacity to meet emergencies and national disasters. An average number of 200 students are registered in NSS each year.
- NSS volunteers help visually impaired students in academics by reading for them, recording their lessons and writing their examinations.
- Focus on issues relating to health, sanitation, hygiene and creating awareness regarding these. Various health camps and cleanliness drives across campus and slum areas near it have been taken out to create awareness and also to motivate people to work towards a clean environment.
- Cleanliness drive: On a regular basis, NSS volunteers are engaged in organizing cleanliness drives in the College campus, and they celebrated Swachh Bharat Abhiyan.
- The NSS aimed to Create NSS blood group data bank and to organize Blood Donation camps in the College, in association with agencies like with Blood Connect, Rotary Club etc.

Yes, the college has an Alumni Association. We are trying to get it registered shortly. The dropout rate after admission in regular course is negligible. Socio-economic, cultural and psychological issues are the main reasons for the dropout factor. To deal with the socio-cultural problems, the counseling cell and grievance cell address the problem of the students and counsel the parents too.

Our teachers encourage all students to continue their quest for knowledge at prestigious centers of higher learning. Many motivated students opt for various courses at JNU/DU/BHU for higher education. We provide all possible logistic and information support to the needy students through Career Counselling Cell. Successful students go through campus selection and/or govt. Jobs through competitive exams. Our college provides free coaching to needy students to face competitive exams successfully.

5.2.4 Enumerate the special support provided to students who are at risk of failure and drop out?

The majority of the students come from rural background. Most them are first generation learners whose parents are either small and marginal farmers or landless

agricultural labourers. Most of them are suffering from inferiority complex. The faculty member becomes a good counselor to give them self-confidence and also extend necessary help in the form of extra counseling. The results of higher classes show their performances. It is due to the extra care undertaken by the faculty members towards such students.

- The drop-out rate in the College is negligible.
- Students who are at risk of dropping out due to financial reasons are provided free ships/scholarships.
- Students are counselled by teachers and also the Principal.
- A student counsellor is also available for this purpose.
- The College counsels families/ parents of such students, whenever required.
- The College has an active counseling cell which endeavours to motivate students and improve their self-esteem.
- The College has been organizing remedial classes for slow learners and academically weak students for all the courses from the beginning of each academic session.
- A Computer Literacy Workshop held this year saw participation of students from different departments. The week long workshop dealt with all aspects of computer literacy starting from the basics to advanced level programming.

The drop-out case is very low. However, some of the girls students drop out in the midst of session due to some family problems or migration from this place and settle in other places.

- Two teachers and one non-teaching staff are proficient in cultural activities who are always enthusiastic to train the students
- Modern professional musical instructor from present students and from ex-students
- One coach to prepare the college team for participating in different district/state level drama competitions
- One cultural committee consisting of teaching and non-teaching staff who has proficiency to prepare the college team for presentation in various cultural programmes

Other Extracurricular Activities

The college has many units like NSS, Red Ribbon Club under the NSS unit, Legal Literacy Club under the NSS unit, Science Forum which organize extracurricular activities throughout the year.

The Range of Student Participation in Inter-collegiate Activities at different levels:

Cultural activities: Students participate in inter-collegiate drama competitions at district level and at state level. They also participate in various cultural activities at state level.

Games & Sports: Students participate in various inter-collegiate tournaments, like Cricket, Volleyball, Football tournaments, Table Tennis (men & women), Chess (men & women) and Judo (men & women) competitions etc. at state level.

• "ABHIYAN" - the magazine of H D Jain College, Ara -- which has for several decades been the chief articulator of knowledge and cultural capital of the College. The magazine encompassed contributions from the students and faculty in Three different sections – English, Hindi and Urdu.

- If the Prospectus is the official window to the College, ABHIYAN provides an informal introduction to the College life. The range of contributions includes academic, literary, everyday experience and reminiscence by students and faculty.
- Published at the behest of the College Principal, the magazine comes annually with a formally nominated Editorial Board.
- Apart from this, students, along with teachers design and publish brochures, posters, banners and other publicity material for various events/workshops/ seminars, organized by their respective departments.
- Even the various cultural societies of the College encourage students to design, publish as well as to do the publicity of the various events organized by them.

There is a statutory provision for students union in all the colleges and university. Due to certain legal wrangles, election of students union could not be conducted. Now the legal bottle-neck has been overcome, and election for students union in the colleges and university is in the pipeline. Meanwhile, in each class we get nominated representative of students as **"Class Representative (CR)"**. In order to provide teeth to students union, the university has allocated a separate fund which is utilized for various union activities.

5.3.6 Give details of various academic and administrative bodies that have student representatives on them.

The college believes in decentralization of the power and giving the equal opportunity to the students in supporting the college administration and the college faculty in running the affairs of the college. For this the college endeavors to provide them with opportunities to participate in the various academic and administrative bodies. The details of academic and administrative having students' representation is as under:

Editorial Board: The Editorial Board comprises of Chief Editors, Editor and Students Editors. The Board invites writings from students and teachers and publishes them in the form of magazine **'ABHIYAN'** annually.

Cultural Society: This Committee is comprised of students to promote the cultural activities among them. Culturally talented students are spotted by Committee members and the efforts are made to develop their skills and talents by encouragement, right training and performances. The committee consists of 5 members, three teachers and two students.

Library Advisory Committee: This committee consists of 9 members. Six are from the teaching faculty. The Librarian and two students are a part of it. This Committee is constituted under the headship of the Faculty members who are in charge of the library. The Committee is responsible for the maintenance of library books and

journals, easy access of the students to the library facilities, students' facilities in the library such as reading rooms, drinking water, uninterrupted power supply, opening and closing times of library, availability of daily newspapers and the maintenance of library records. Suggestions are invited from the students and faculty readers for making atmosphere of the library congenial.

The direct participation of students may be found in the following bodies.

a) NCC, (b) NSS, (c) Debating Society, (d) Cultural Society, (e) Games and Sports Committee. Students often voice their grievances through the chosen representatives in the select bodies.

- > To help the students develop a sense of discipline, confidence creativity, inventiveness, a strong sense of nationality & qualities of leadership.
- To organise lectures, seminars, conferences, debates, essay-writing competitions, extra-curricular activities, cultural programmes & games and sports for the students.
- > To impart skill-development training exploiting the available resources: to promote rural orientated industrial training programmes.
- > To combine the ancient Gurukul system of education with the presentday technology.
- > To conduct research highlighting the concept of ecological balance for the sustenance of man on the earth.
- To inculcate moral & spiritual values among the students for the socio-economic development of the country.

The college is determined to achieve its Vision and Mission by imparting quality education to the students for their all round development. To inculcate ethical values in the students by imparting proper guidance and motivation. By helping the students to overcome their sense of inferiority in facing new challenges by creating their skills.

The College's ideal is to empower young men and women to grow into well-rounded citizens who can contribute to the community from the local to the global level. It aims at fulfilling this ideal by furnishing its students with freedom, democratic institutions, and opportunities for learning both within and outside the classroom.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

Principal is the pivot and motivational force in designing and implementation of quality plans and policy. Most of the matters are addressed by the Principal, with the continuous advice of faculty members in the form of various issue and subject based sub-committees that are formed within the Staff Council. For matters related to academic policies, the affiliating University supports the recommendations made by these committees, routed through the Principal, in the form of sanctioning funds and working for infrastructural strengthening, wherever required. The affiliating University considers and approves the decisions and monitors and regulates funding for all sorts of planning and policy-making in the College.

IQAC cell strives for quality in all spheres– academic, administrative etc. & tries to involve all the stakeholders of Higher Education for quality sustenance. The plans which are chalked out are implemented with proper monitoring by IQAC.

- Better quality education.
- Opening of career oriented programmes.
- Opening of post-graduate courses.
- Establishing academic-industry linkage.
- Social commitments through the different wings of the college such as NSS, NCC etc.
- Empowerment of women by constituting different cells like sexual harassment cell, anti-ragging cell etc.
- Skill development programmes.
- Provision of universal education to all.
- Extending quality education to students of weaker section of the society for social inclusion.
- Provision of co-operation through coordination with other institutions and agencies.

6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring:

- The policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission
- Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan
- Interaction with stakeholders
- Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders
- Reinforcing the culture of excellence
- Champion organizational change

- Generally the leadership follow the guidelines received by the University on matters related to administration or teaching. However on issues where there is any scope of formulating a policy, the Staff Council to formulate and recommend draft policies and proposed action plans. At this stage the leadership of college, i.e. the Staff Council, takes up the role of an initiator to begin discussion on the issue. The leadership identifies the ideal platform for this discussion and encourages the relevant committee body/committee/council and its members to arrive at a consensus and recommend a definite vision along with a policy statement to carry out its implementation.
- The committees formed either in the Staff Council or by the Governing Body work within the rules laid down by competent authority/University. The leadership works towards clearing all financial and other logistical difficulties that come in the way of the implementation of any policy as decided by the committees.
- The leadership also helps in resolving issues concerning other intra-committee or inter-committee affairs.
- The leadership uses its vision and reasons to decide the timing to involve other stakeholders such as students, non-teaching employees, the guardians or other section of employees whenever it feels appropriate.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The Principal holds regular meetings of Academic Council and other committees to discuss the ways and means to implement the decisions taken. He also convenes the meetings of different departments to ensure the effective implementation of department calendar within the prescribed time. The required instructions are conveyed through regular notices. As Principal being the executive Head, he oversees and monitors the process of implementation. He also constitutes committees as per the requirement and regularly convenes the meetings of conveners of the committees. He acts as facilitator to his subordinate staff so that formulated action plan is accomplished with the spirit of co-operation, co-ordination, mutual trust and dignity. All the activities are duly monitored, analyzed and assessed by IQAC at the end of each academic session for further improvement. Requisite feedback is obtained from all the stakeholders like parents, alumni, students, faculty, researchers and the efficacy of evaluation of policy is done accordingly.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The top-management of H D Jain College, Ara is a stimulating and motivational apex body that inspires the staff to inculcate innovative vision and incorporate the same in the existing and future plans and programmes of the institution. Two general meetings of the Managing Committee are held in an academic session. The meetings are chaired by the President. The Principal and two elected members from teaching faculty represent the staff in the meetings. The Principal prepares the detailed agenda on the basis of feedback from all sources. It is discussed in the Managing Committee meetings. Proposals for academic excellence are accepted positively. Teachers are allowed to participate in research, refresher and orientation courses. All the appointments of faculty positions are made in which top management is always present. The President, the General Secretary and other office bearers take keen interest in the proceedings. The Managing Committee always makes positive and constructive contribution in improving the academic environment. Issues and proposals advanced in the interest of faculty members are discussed and decided unconditionally.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The College encourages its students, faculty and the administrative staff to assume positions of responsibility and become accountable.

- Head of Department: At the level of the faculty the principle of seniority-byrotation applies to the position of Head of Department of a department and ensures that each teacher participates in running the department at least once over their time at the College. Though not statutory, this position provides administrative experience to the faculty Members.
- **Bursar**: One faculty member is given the opportunity to take the position of Bursar and impact policies and decision-making. The appointment against this post, for a period of three years, is done on the recommendation of college. Other important posts that follow the same model are:
- Public Information Officer: Addresses all RTI enquiries.
- **Controller of Examinations:** All examinations conducted throughout the year are done under the supervision of this officer.
- Coordinator of Practical Examinations: For the smooth conduct of Semester Practical Examinations the College appoints a Science Faculty member, on rotation basis for one year. The Coordinator, in association with the HoD fixes the schedule, examiners and other necessary facilities for the exams, including remuneration to examiners, invigilators and lab staff.
- **Coordinator of Evaluation Centers in the College:** Each year the College is given the responsibility to be the centre for evaluation of answer scripts of at least one subject. A faculty member is appointed as the Coordinator for this purpose.
- Equal opportunity Cell coordinator: A faculty member is appointed to look after the needs and comfort of the PwD students of the College, in coordination with the University Cell.
- Media Coordinator: All official announcements are made through this faculty member chosen by the Principal for a defined term.
- Nodal Officer: He/she is the Public relations officer of the College. These posts

give faculty member extra exposure to new skills and attributes. Teachers exhibit their leadership qualities through convenorships of various committees

- The Non-teaching staff has its Union President, Secretary and Treasurer.
- Non-teaching staff members have the opportunity to become President/Secretary of the Thrift and Credit Society.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

A number of committee has been constituted by the Principal to run the college properly and smoothly. The senior members of the faculty are heading the respective committee. The Principal is the ex-officio chairman of all the committee. The teachers and the staff have been involved in the process of decision making and its implementation. The committee enjoys operational autonomy and does their works under the rules and regulations of the University.

In this way the principal with help of all the heads of the committee and the faculty members performs the work of the institution.

Extra-curricular, student support activities like NSS& NCC and co-curricular activities like sports etc, the In-charge of such activities have operational autonomy to some extent.

6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

Yes, our college believes strongly in participative management. This is one of the axes of our success. For example, at the departmental level there is a departmental council where decisions are taken to implement academic calendar without hustle. The council decides as to how the development work will progress, how and where the excursion of students trip will go and who will accompany the students in the trip. Similarly, the select committees decide how and where the chosen students will participate in sports and games. The selection of such students is done by the committee members purely on the basis of merit. Likewise all the committees in the college function and contribute their best in achieving excellence.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

The college has a formally stated quality policy in which all the members of teaching staff are expected to fill the required self assessment report proformas. These proformas are monitored, kept and maintained by IQAC. The Principal keeps himself informed about the performance of each member of faculty. Besides this policy, formal and informal meetings are held by the management with various members to discuss ways and means of improving the quality of teaching and providing better ambience to the students. The Principal, with the assistance of the office superintendent, also regularly monitors the performance of the non- teaching staff members.

The members of the teaching staff are encouraged by the authorities and Heads of the departments to aim at excellence and enhance their academic knowledge. Teachers are encouraged to take up UGC Minor/Major research projects, attend refresher courses, seminars and workshops.

6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

The college certainly has a long run plans for all round development. No doubt, development is a continuous process. With this motive the college authority makes a future plan for upgrading all the science laboratories, construction of in-door and out-door stadium, provision for modern facility in the class rooms and enrich the library with modern facility. The college authority makes a proposal for all such developmental works and the same are forwarded to the University or State Government or the UGC to allocate the resources for it.

6.2.3 **D**escribe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

Our college is a constituent unit of Veer Kunwar Singh University, Ara. The Principal is the head of the institution, who is working under the rules and regulations of the University and the UGC. The University makes the policy and the college implements it through the Principal, as the head of the institution.

The Principal as the institutional head plays a pivotal role in the administration of the college and he is responsible for executing all the policy decisions made by the university. The Principal constitutes various committees who work on behalf of the Principal. The Principal maintains harmonious relationship between the teachers and the staff for the congenial atmosphere for smooth functioning of the college. The Principal takes the help of the Staff Council consisting of all the teaching members of the college.

Bursar has been appointed by the University for assisting financial matters, while for examination section controller of examination has been appointed by the University to assist the Principal for smooth conduction of examination. Apart from that, the senior most faculty member has been appointed as Coordinator/Convener/Nodal officer for assisting the college authority for smooth functioning of the institution.

- 6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following
 - Teaching& Learning

 - Industry interaction

Teaching & Learning: The teaching learning process is student centric and enhancement of quality in teaching and learning is the primary thrust area. The academic calendar is notified in advance and it helps the institution to adhere to academic delivery system as per schedule. The students are encouraged to consult multiple sources of information and through spoken english classes, personality development workshops and add on courses, the institution aims at enhancing their global employability The teachers are encouraged to consult multiple sources like Multimedia, Web, online journals through INFILIBNET and aim at excellence in teaching.

The teachers through personal contact, class tests and assignments provide individual attention and monitor the progress of each student. Students are free to submit their queries and feedback to the office. A healthy teacher- taught relationship

is maintained. The college has achieved great success in this area as a large number of teachers have taken research and academic development quite seriously. The members are encouraged to attend various academic programmes and courses, seminars and workshops. The college supplements the traditional teaching methods with modern ones like smart classes, use of ICT etc.

Research & Development: We promote and sustain research culture by giving necessary facilities to our teachers and research students of different faculties. The affiliating university allows the faculties to supervise research scholars for Ph.D degree and UGC also provides financial assistance for minor and major research projects, the teachers of the college have successfully guided several dozens of students for Ph.D. degree and more than several research papers were published by them.

Community engagement: The NSS officer coordinates various extension activities of the college leading to community engagement. Through NSS, the students are encouraged to undertake community-oriented activities like Social work, heath-hygiene awareness, medical camp, adult education and literacy, blood donation, AIDS awareness, environmental awareness.

Human resource management: Career and Counseling Cell organizes regular classes in spoken English, personality development, psycho- social counselling etc.

Industry interaction: The College constantly endeavours to establish better relations

and interaction with the industry. Students of Commerce & Business Administration, Information Technology etc. are encouraged and guided by the faculty to get training in reputed industrial houses. Experts from industries are invited to have interaction with our students.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The Principal regularly meets the students of each department and get the feedback from them about the functioning of the department as well as the college. He also interacts with the senior students and the guardians and get adequate information about the overall performance of the various departments of the institution. Generally the Principal does not transmit it to the University, but he tries to rectify the problems, if any, with the help of the senior faculty members.

Generally the fourth pillar of the state is quite vigilant and through their reporting, the University authority and others get the information about the institution.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

The proper functioning of the college is possible with the efficient internal coordination and the team work with the active support of the different committee constituted in this regard. The Principal selects the dedicated, devoted and sincere teachers as the members of the committee. 6.2.7 Enumerate the resolutions made by the Management Council in the last year and the status of implementation of such resolutions.

Being a constituent unit of the University, college has no power to make any resolution. The Syndicate and the Senate of the University make resolutions; the college can only implement it.

For internal matter sometimes college makes its own policy to improve the academic and administrative conditions of the institution.

6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

There is no provision of autonomy in the university systems of Bihar. Each affiliated college has to function within the framework formulated by the university and governed by the Bihar State Universities Act, 1976.

6.2.9 How does the Institution ensure that grievances / complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyse the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?

The college has in place an effective mechanism for grievances to be redressed. The Grievance Cell meets in case there is a written or oral complaint received by any member or through the Principal. Grievances/Complaints/suggestions boxes are installed at different places in the college campus. As the college is a coeducational institution, the safety and dignity of the girl students is ensured through a Cell for Women Empowerment Cell and Prevention of Sexual Harassment Cell. This cell has women teachers as its members. These cells, Discipline Committee and Anti Ragging Committee members act promptly to resolve the complaints/grievances.

The complaint of any student can be dropped in the provided complaint box or can be sent through e-mail to the Principal/ faculty members.

6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute ? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?

Neither the college filed the court case nor any other court case filed against the college for the last four years.

6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

The College gives utmost importance to the collection of the feedback from the students regarding performance of the institution.

The Principal with the help of faculty members prepare a questionnaire on the performances of the teachers as well as other matters of the college. After the questionnaire is finalized, the senior faculty members randomly distribute this paper among the students and ask them to fill up the questionnaire without any fear and favour.

The students are directed to submit their feedback form in the office of the Principal. The data thus generated is carefully analyzed by the Principal with the help of Prof.-In–Charge.

In this way the Principal gets the feedback from the students and makes appropriate steps to improve the functioning of the college.

- The College welcomes suggestions from all stakeholders and attempts to address it at the earliest through various committees.
- Complaints made and feedback given directly to the principal are also equally effective in streamlining academic and administrative affairs.

6.3 **Faculty Empowerment Strategies**

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?

The college is always ready to develop the professional skills to both the teaching and the Non-teaching staff of the college. The faculty members are encouraged to enrich their knowledge by attending seminars, conferences and Refresher and orientation courses. The college has also organized workshops as well as departmental seminars, in which the faculty members positively involved to have deep knowledge of the subjects.

The Non-teaching staffs are encouraged to get the computer knowledge. For this a training programme organizes by the college and all the non-teaching staff participate in it. By enhancing the basic knowledge of computer usage, the staff enhances their skills and does their work smoothly.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

At the college level, the Principal motivates the faculty members to be acquainted with the modern technology for teaching and learning. The talented and the aspiring teachers and the staff are given the opportunity to enrich their skills by availing the schemes of the UGC, CSIR or others. The Faculty Development Programme of the UGC gives this opportunity of the teachers to avail this programme. They are motivated and encouraged to do their research work. Such teachers are given duty leave with the permission of the University.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The performance of faculty members is assessed and monitored by the head of the concerned department. The annual appraisal is conducted by issuing them a questionnaire. The college authority IQAC studies the report and also gets the feedback from the students of the performance of the faculty members without disclosing the names of the students. After analyzing the appraisal report as well as the feedback the college authority evaluates it. If he finds any difficulty in getting the proper report of the functioning of the staff, the college authority closely monitors the participation of the teachers and staff in various activities of the college. In this way he receives correct information for better appraisal.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

After, receiving the performance appraisal reports, the Principal reviews it thoroughly. If he find any issue of concern, the concern faculty member is suitably advised personally. The concern teacher improves or overcomes the lacunae without lowering self-esteem. Wherever required, counseling is provided to the staff in order to help them improve their professional capabilities.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

There are several welfare schemes for the staff members of this college as per university laws. For example loan privileges, roster (reservation rules), free accommodation in the welfare hostel for superintendent, text books/journals facility and so on. Many teachers and non-teaching staff members avail themselves of interest-free loan facility from their respective PF accounts. The non-teaching staff members obtain monetary festival allowances, subsidized accommodation, dress facilities and so on.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

As per the University Act and Statute, the institution does not authority to attract and retain eminent faculties. However, we invite eminent scholars from nearby universities for special lectures.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

To optimize the utilization of available funds, the apex committee of the institution meets to discuss the liabilities and development plans and other financial needs and propose a tentative budget in the beginning of the financial year. The principal proposes the expected financial needs and the tentative budget to the register of Veer Kunwar Singh University, Ara to sanction the budget. Then after funds are made available. Thus, there are two tiers monitoring of the fund.

College development committee and purchase committee of the institution are involved in the whole operation. Grant received from the university grant commission are utilized directly as per the directions of the UGC.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

The College has its account relating to all transactions audited once a year. The audit is of two kinds: one is internal audit, in which the auditors of the University audit the entire income and expenditures made during the financial year. The state government also undertakes the external audit by the team of the Auditors from the Office of the Accountant General, Patna.

Both the team of auditors submit their reports to the University and the Governments separately. Till date no major audit objections are reported. No discrepancy is found in maintaining the income and expenditure of the fund.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.

The major sources of the college receipts are the salary and contingent amounts from the University in every month. The tuition fee and other developmental fee received from the students are deposited to the University Account "A". The tuition fee of the self-financing courses is another receipts. The grants received from UGC under various schemes and the State Government for developmental purposes.

6.4.4 Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).

The college has received Rs. 35 lac for construction of Girls hostel from the UGC under XI Five year Plan. Another efforts made by the institution for obtaining the UGC grants under merged schemes as well as the additional grants. The total amount received from the UGC under XI Plan was Rs. 40.95 lac. The college also received grants from the HRD department of the Government of Bihar for the construction of Class Rooms - Rs. 24,30,804.00 during financial year 2011 – 12

 - (a) The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has been established in the college on 05/08/2015. The Cell has been playing a pro-active role. The basic policy of the institution to impart quality education to the students and also fulfills its mission. Hence, continuous improvement in the quality of teaching-learning process is the institutional policy. The IQAC is an active and effective advisory body to suggest infrastructural and technological development in the campus.
 - (b) There are several meetings were held with the members of the IQAC. Some of the important suggestions are as follows:
 - Online admission system

- To make the campus Wi-Fi.
- To automate the Library
- To constitute the departmental council for academic excellence.

All such suggestions of the IQAC are put before the senior faculty members and after discussions and deliberations a proposal for academic excellence is made. Some of the proposals have been executed by the Principal and rest has been sent to the University for the Final Approval.

- (c) Yes, IQAC consists of two external members, the members had made suggestion to improve the intuitional teaching and placement opportunities.
- (d) The members of IQAC received valuable feedbacks from the students and the Alumni about the teaching learning process and its excellence.
- (e) Four senior faculties are the members of IQAC. They air the view of the faculty and endeavor to incorporate their needs in the major academic policy and its implementations.

6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes', give details on its operationalisation.

There is certainly an integrated framework for the quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities in the college. For maintaining the academic and administrative quality, the observations of the Cell is reviewed by the Principal and the senior faculty members. The college authority tries to execute the recommendations of the IQAC.

6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If 'yes', give details enumerating its impact.

The college ensures that the advice of the IQAC is fully adhered to by the staff. The orientation session is organized time to time for the staff to improve their working system. Small and informal meeting with the staff and teachers by the coordinator IQAC helps the effective implementation of the recommendations of IQAC.

6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes', how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

Although there is no formal academic auditing system in the college. However, in informal way, the college conducts such auditing. The staff council meeting is organized by the Principal, in which he interacts with the faculty members regarding self-appraisal forms of the members, feedback given by the students as

well as observations of the IQAC. In this way the college undertakes the academic auditing in a informal way.

6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?

The internal quality assurance mechanisms of the College are aligned with the external agencies like affiliating University and UGC. The College is also striving regularly to align with the requirements and guidelines provided by the NAAC.

6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

Various platforms come in handy for assessing the quality of teaching learning process in the college. The IQAC is the basic system to review the quality of teaching and learning process of the college.

The performance of the students in the internal tests gives the concrete idea to the teachers about the area where the students need to help.

Apart from this the feedback from the students about the teaching quality of the faculty members is another mechanism for reviewing the teaching learning process.

{ Commerce Laboratory }

- **Goal:** The Commerce Laboratory was set up to enhance the quality of students on a sustained basis. The Commerce Laboratory provides the students with an environment which is conductive to their all round development.
 - To Encourage the self-learning process in the students through complete involvement in academic and co-curricular activities. Broadening the scope of student's knowledge through continuous exposure to the practical world.
 - Encouraging creative and innovative ideas.
 - Developing organization skills, communication skills and leadership qualities.

- Engaging rigorous research oriented activities to develop an updated database.
- Providing a platform to the students to exhibit their literary skills.

The context

Setting up of a laboratory in the field of Commerce was quite vague initially, and the biggest challenge was to convey the idea to the students unambiguously. Hence frequent meetings of the teachers with the Principal were held and finally it was decided that the laboratory would be set up to operate in two ways. Firstly through surveys, visits, group discussions, presentation, business quiz, etc. where the students would get an opportunity to showcase their competitive skills and secondly through charts and model wherein students would be encouraged to display their innovative ideas.

The efforts taken have led to the establishment of a sophisticated and well – equipped laboratory. Every department in the college is provided with some space in the laboratory and charts and models are renewed at regular intervals.

***** The Practice

The Commerce Laboratory conducts various activities like Guest Lectures, Industrial Visits, Workshops, Surveys, Inter-Collegiate Competitions etc. The activities for the academic year are planned and discussed with the Principal and concerned faculty members. Once they are finalized, frequent meeting of the core committee of the students, teacher – in –charge of the Commerce Laboratory, Principal and head dept. of college are held to chalk out the details regarding their implementation.

The uniqueness of this practice lies in the fact that it gives the students a scope to generate novel ideas/activities and implement them successfully. To quote a few examples, events like Mock WTO, Mock Budget, Business Talent Hunt were the brainchild of our students. In the process of conducting these activities they develop perfect organizing skills, communication skill and the art of promoting the events; we believe this helps students in achieving the goal of inculcating the habit of self-learning.

Evidence of Success:

Principals, teachers and students from different renowned colleges have visited our laboratory. Industries and Agriculture has provided its association for conducting a mega event named Business Talent Hunt.

Commerce Laboratory has planned and implemented various co-curricular activities which have helped in evolving many successful process like: Bridging the gap between education in theory and implementation in practice: This has been carried out in activities like visits to companies, guest lectures, surveys and mock events, Commerce Laboratory strives to train the students in the use of their theoretical knowledge in the actual practice world. Computerized accounting, auditing

The students of the Commerce Laboratory organize and manage all the events, even inter-collegiate events professionally, it enhances their organizational and leadership qualities.

The students are given wide exposure to the outside world through interaction with industrialists, educationists and the media. This contributes to their all-round development and widens their perspectives. The students of the Commerce Laboratory generate many innovative ideas and they are given full freedom to implement them successfully. Faculty members play a supportive role.

Development of communication skills: Through continuos interaction with Industrialists, Business establishments Educationists, Media, principal and faculty members, students have learnt to communicate effectively.

The results indicate that the Commerce Laboratory has been successful in contributing towards the quality enhancement of our students.

Problems encountered and Resources required:

There have been a few minor problems in the course of implementing the quality enhancement programmes. However they have been solved successfully. To quote a few,

- As a constituent college to the University of V K S University, Ara, a college doesn't have freedom to design its own curriculum and as such the activities to the Commerce Laboratory cannot be made a part of the curriculum. However, a few activities like visits, surveys and lectures are conducted as practicals.
- V K S University, Ara has not allocated any specific amount as fee for the purpose of Commerce Laboratory but college has solved by utilizing some amount from the Students Welfare Fund. Many meritorious students from our college are pursuing professional courses and hence they cannot devote much time to the activities of the laboratory.

Resources Required : The resources required for conducting the activities of the Commerce Laboratory are generated by the college. The resources mainly required are participation and guidance of the teachers on a continuous basis.

Organizational Arrangements in Internal Quality Assurance Cell

Goal

H D Jain College, Ara, has taken strategic strides to become a leading institution by imparting quality education. In this direction the primary goal of the IQAC is to work on strategies and ensure the implementation of these to build an institution that will stand tall for the high impact of its teaching.

Context:

The Quality Cell has been conceived and developed as a centre to facilitate and support activities of the teaching community. It provides resource support (non-

financial) and acts on feedback received from all the stakeholders. It design and develops strategies and implements these to improve the overall quality of the class room transaction. The co-ordinator of the IQAC works in co-ordination with all the staff.

Practice:

The cell operates with one individual exclusively coordinating the activities and five senior teaching members and two external persons from society who work and support the coordinator. The cell interacts with the teachers at the departmental level periodically to get feedback and suggestions from all the teachers in the department. The departments will set goals and targets with a time frame and submit the same to the IQAC. These will periodically be assessed by the cell and a review meeting will be held.

The cell also introduces programmes or dialogues to ensure accountability with transparency in all teaching practices and assessment patterns. In this effect the cell made it mandatory for all teachers to issue a copy of the Course Plan to all the students. The cell initiated dialogue among the departments to introduce transparency into the assessment of the students' learning outcome.

The cell interacts with the Student Council, Parent's Committee and receives feedback from these groups and uses this feedback in planning its strategies, especially in bringing transparency / objectivity / accountability in the teaching-learning-evaluation process.

It also initiates workshops for the administrative staff (include the support staff) who are involved in maintaining the campus and its surroundings. Follow up workshops will also be periodically held to reinforce the training.

The cell also acts as a documenting centre for the seminars / workshops / publications. Documentary files maintained in respect of those who attended / presented papers in seminar / workshops. These are subsequently uploaded on the institution website: www.hdjaincollege.org against the concerned teacher's name in the concerned department.

This documentation has worked as a motivational factor for teachers by the work of the teacher becoming a public document for those interested.

Evidence of success :

For IQAC, the major success has been acceptance of the concept as part of the processes in the campus. The initiatives of the cell are now accepted by the teaching community and the students. The initiative on strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats (SWOT) analysis introduced in every teaching department was accepted by all and worked upon positively. Subsequent review meetings held with all the departments to work out strategies based on the SWOT analysis.

Problems encountered and Resources required:

The primary problem encountered is that of resistance – to change. A lot of convincing and persistent measures to alter strategies wherever needed has resulted in a lot of time being lost.



Teaching is a live performance, everyday throws up its own challenges and anxieties. Our students come from varied cultural and class backgrounds—it is a singular challenge to rise above a chalk-and-talk approach and engage them in ways that dissolves their scepticism and generate in them an interest in the subject.

Finding a good numbers of academically bright students genuinely interested to take philosophy as Honours paper. Exposure of students to English language as a medium of instruction is big challenges.

Strengths

- We get excellent students to learn from Well-equipped labs, very cooperative lab staff and some quick learner teachers make this Department unique, vibrant and excellent.
- As the Department boasts well-equipped laboratories, it cannot go without highlighting its constant endeavour to motivate and rigorously train its students in experimental and analytical skills, with the help of the untiring efforts of its ever-dedicated faculty.
- The knowledge and understanding of the subject is very good of the faculty members. Students are being taught in interactive and audio-visual methods. Practicals are done very meticulously also. Extra classes are taken regularly for the sake of students. A good and healthy academic ambience is maintained within the department. A healthy, cooperative mutual understanding between the faculties and the students are also maintained.
- The faculty of the Department specializes in areas that are chronologically staggered and thematically diverse. This allows paper-wise coverage of the entire programme by teachers, allowing the students to have a holistic perspective of issues.
- The socio-cultural and economic profile of the students in the Department is diverse and heterogeneous, thus contributing to a sense of inclusive learning process.

Weaknesses

• Acute Shortage of permanent teaching faculty members.

- Bilingual teaching is not a feature of the Department formally. Hindi reading resources for students are not easily available.
- There is no facility for Braille reading software like JOSH for PWD students.
- The highly active physics department jostling with motivated students and teachers sometime feel the need of more space for carrying out projects and research activities. All the existing human resources of the department which includes teachers, students and non teaching staff, the department runs all the activities including regular college lab work almost smoothly. We believe, if we can create some more space and better laboratory equipments we can excel to the even higher levels.

Opportunities

- Seminars and conferences related to core and interdisciplinary areas.

Challenges

- Every year, the Department gets around 65-70% students having done their schooling in Hindi medium. The College, offers all Science courses only in English medium. It often becomes a challenge for the teachers to bridge the gap amongst students arising out of a difference in the formal approach and methodology needs to be evolved by the Department to overcome this problem.
- Dedicated space is required for the students and faculty to pursue research and additional projects without hindrance.
- To Make all Physics class room ICT-enabled: at present the Department has this facility only in one room.
- The collection at the Department library level needs to cater to the study material requirement for visually challenged (PWD) students.

Future Plans

- To develop high quality laboratory in the department in which experiments leading to research publications and thesis work can be performed.






